01 INTRODUCTION


THE VALUE OF OUR HERITAGE

Our environment - including waterways, landscapes, woodlands, bogs, uplands, and native wildlife and plants - forms an essential part of our heritage.


BUILT HERITAGE

It sets out our commitments to conservation efforts, such as preserving hedgerows and creating green spaces in urban areas, vital for the survival of local wildlife.


PROTECT OUR HERITAGE

“Built heritage refers to physical structures, sites, and monuments that have historical, cultural, architectural, or social significance and are recognised for their value to society. These structures are tangible representations of a community’s past and contribute to its identity.”

OUR HERITAGE

Fermanagh and Omagh’s story is deeply connected to its built heritage. The diverse and rich built heritage features ancient settlements, religious sites, places of worship, and historical monuments dating back to prehistoric times. From megalithic tombs, ancient churches and castles to grand houses and estates, these structures shape today’s landscape. More than just physical buildings, they provide a window into the history of the area, connecting generations and their stories.

Stones and structures such as early medieval raths, crannogs, standing stones, and places of worship scattered across the landscape stand as tangible legacies of our past.

Advancements in radiocarbon dating reveal the area’s deep historical roots, including the presence of court tombs and early settlement artefacts.


Archaeological evidence also highlights significant transformations in our built heritage, such as the development of industrial mills, the construction of bridges and defensive sites, as well as the 17th-century Plantation of Ulster and the profound impact of the 19th-century industrial boom.






OUR HERITAGE

Preserving the stories of Fermanagh and Omagh District is about more than just remembering the past; the stories, language and traditions form the area’s cultural fabric, maintaining its identity and connecting generations. Sharing these stories not only enriches understanding of our cultural heritage – or what we refer to as intangible heritage - but also enhances our connection to our physical surroundings.

Recording oral histories is essential for preserving the extensive legends passed down through generations. The area’s musical heritage, in all its many forms, is highly valued in the community.

The diversity of languages, particularly the Irish language and Ulster Scots traditions, provides a vehicle to preserve and share the District’s heritage, through historical stories, folklore and traditional knowledge across generations.

Our rich heritage is also reflected in place names, family names, and townlands, highlighting the deep roots of the community. Enniskillen Castle Museums, the Ardhowen, and the Strule Arts Centre play key roles in showcasing local culture through exhibitions, educational programmes, and events, while genealogy research connects us to the personal histories that have shaped this community.

Pastimes and sports form an important part of our cultural heritage, reflecting the traditions, values and shared experiences of the community, and offering insight into how people have historically connected with and participated in their cultural identity.

Transport heritage reflects a rich evolution, from life on the lough using cots to the advent of the railway, and everything in between.

This proud cultural legacy is at the core of the Heritage Plan, which aims to further develop, promote, and make our heritage experiences more accessible, ensuring they are inclusive and relevant for all.

STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES

IMPROVE ACCESS

Identify, explain and enhance access to our natural, built and cultural heritage, ensuring its value and conservation. This objective focuses on making heritage inclusive and accessible to transform hidden heritage into valued heritage and a source of inspiration, education and enjoyment.

WORK IN PARTNERSHIP

Collaborate with partners and stakeholders to create opportunities for awareness, engagement and participation supporting greater inclusion and diversity. By empowering individuals to learn, develop skills and explore heritage, this objective promotes inclusivity and a sense of belonging within the community through accessible and enriching opportunities.

DEVELOP & PROMOTE

Develop and promote our heritage assets to contribute to community wellbeing, heritage-led regeneration and tourism within the District. This objective enhances diverse heritage elements, attracting visitors and fostering economic growth while promoting a unique sense of place.

PROTECTING OUR HERITAGE

Champion the sustainable development, conservation and preservation of natural, built and cultural heritage. Taking action to protect our heritage ensures the sustainable development of future generations, preserves historical richness and leaves a lasting legacy for all. This objective prioritises the enduring vibrancy of our heritage in the community.

IMPROVE ACCESS

1. Heritage Events

Develop, deliver and support a calendar of annual heritage events and activities that celebrate local culture, history, and traditions across the District.

2. Stewardship & Access

Support, where possible, good stewardship, improved access and sharing of knowledge, information, artefacts and interpretation. Support rural and marginalised communities to promote equitable access to heritage opportunities.

3. Promote Local Stories

Explore, develop and promote the story of Fermanagh and Omagh, improve understanding about how particular heritage assets fit into the story and contribute to local significance, including recognition of places of worship as part of the Districts built and social heritage.

4. Community Heritage Surveys

Partner with community groups to conduct localised heritage surveys, such as vernacular building surveys, with professional guidance and support from the council.

5. Manage Collections

Continue to implement collection management policies (2024-2027) in line with Museum Accreditation standards.

6. Preserve Intangible Heritage

Support and deliver initiatives that integrate cultural and intangible heritage, including folklore, language, oral history, sport, pastimes, traditional crafts, music, and storytelling, to preserve and increase access to these practices within the community.

7. Enhance Fermanagh County Museum

Support Fermanagh County Museum, part of Enniskillen Castle Museums, in sharing the unique heritage of the local area through its collections and community engagement for new and existing audiences.

8. Build Heritage Skills

Offer a rolling programme of training sessions to build skills in areas such as oral history, conservation, archival research, and event planning.

9. Enhance Heritage Learning

Create and support initiatives that make learning about local heritage more accessible through workshops, talks, walks and tours, curriculum based school programmes, and community events.

10. Support Small Projects

Provide dedicated funding support for small heritage projects including European Heritage Open Day, Culture Night, Irish Language and Ulster Scots and providing access to heritage walks, talks and tours.

11. Signage & Digital Access

Improve access and understanding of key heritage sites through interpretation and digital access through online collections.

DEVELOP & PROMOTE

1. Promote Heritage Initiatives

Develop a clear and consistent communication plan to improve visibility, coordination and promotion of Council led and community partners heritage activity.

2. Storytelling Staff

Upskilling customer service staff to become storytellers of the place to develop staff skills and understanding and improve the visitor experience.

3. Integrate Heritage in Planning

Work cohesively to ensure that the care, conservation and enjoyment of heritage is integrated into planning processes and ensure heritage forms part of regeneration projects where appropriate.

4. Empower Heritage Champions

Identify and empower local volunteers and advocates to act as 'Heritage Champions', promoting heritage awareness and supporting community-led initiatives.

5. Explore Place Names & Stories

Prioritise projects that explore place names, family names, local stories, and the District's agricultural heritage including themes such as island life, railway history, ancient woodlands, and local folklore, to deepen understanding of people and place, promoting community cohesion.

6. Support Heritage Events

Support through sponsorship & grant aid heritage events to promote awareness and enjoyment of our heritage, attracting local communities and global tourists.

7. Celebrate Cultural Pastimes

Promote and support the inclusion of cultural pastimes such as native and traditional sports, local clubs, storytelling, and music to celebrate and preserve community traditions.

8. Develop Exhibitions & Activities

Develop, support, and showcase high quality, locally relevant exhibitions and associated activities, such as talks and workshops, to increase engagement with the District's natural, cultural, and built heritage.

9. Collaborate on Heritage Projects

Collaborate with local community groups, heritage organisations, and schools to co-create and deliver engaging heritage projects that reflect shared values and histories.



WORK IN PARTNERSHIP

1. Support Cultural Traditions

Support initiatives to explore Irish and Ulster Scots tradition. Strengthening connections with cultural traditions.

2. Explore Genealogy and Diaspora

Support local genealogy and explore diaspora initiatives within Fermanagh and Omagh District, develop projects with partners that highlight stories of place, including emigration, migration, and immigration.

3. Enable Community Heritage Projects

Cuilcagh Lakelands Geopark is a place where outstanding and internationally important geological heritage is used to support sustainable development through conservation, education, community engagement and regenerative tourism that is driven and shaped by local community, businesses and stakeholders.

4. Sustain Heritage-led Projects

Continue to support the sustainability of the heritage led projects ie: Lough Erne Pilgrim Way, Enniskillen Workhouse, Omagh Workhouse, Omagh Music Trail.

5. Strengthen Collaboration

Develop links with Heritage Officers and Museums from neighbouring and cross border Councils to share knowledge, best practice, lessons learned and partner on suitable projects.

6. Build Heritage Networks

Create a facilitated network for local heritage groups and individuals to meet regularly, share learning, collaborate, and strengthen sector wide connections.

7. Highlight Local Archaeology

Collaborate with partners to explore and highlight the unique archaeology of the area, fostering discovery and preservation.

8. Host Schools Heritage Conference

Organise a yearly heritage conference for schools, featuring participation from local heritage groups. Empower students to select a new theme each year to ensure relevance and engagement.

9. Provide Community Toolkits

Provide resources to support independent project delivery, including guidance on funding, heritage project planning, and clear signposting on who to contact within council structures.

PROTECTING OUR HERITAGE

1. Enhance Funding Profile

Improve District’s profile with funding bodies through project highlight reports showcasing the work of Council and communities.

2. Advance Community Engagement

Sustain our commitment to the community by advancing our school and community engagement initiatives. Including eco and forest schools and life long learning programmes.

3. The Sperrins and Cuilcagh Lakelands
UNESCO Global Geopark

Support the objectives of the Sperrins Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty Management Plan, Cuilcagh Lakelands UNESCO Global Geopark Development Plan.

4. Promote Community Archaeology

Explore opportunities to support community focused archaeology initiatives that raise the profile of local sites, encourage education, and improve access.

5. Interpret Key Historical Events

Highlight the transformational impact of Famine and industrialisation, including emigration and language, through interpretation and storytelling.

6. Promote Sustainability and Protection

Collaborate to support and align with strategies and policies that promote sustainability and the protection of our natural, built, and cultural heritage - ensuring a joined up approach to environmental and heritage priorities across the District.

7. Heritage Regeneration

Integrate heritage considerations into Council and partner led capital projects, ensuring that the built and natural heritage objectives are embedded in the planning and development process of project mandates and business case development.

MONITORING
& REPORTING

While the Heritage Action Plan sets a course of action over the next five years, our priorities will remain adaptable, ensuring resilience in the face of changing circumstances.

The vision and strategic objectives provide guidance, instilling confidence in the Council’s commitment and fostering an environment conducive to sustained collaboration and investment.

A key driver is the active involvement of a diverse range of individuals in heritage activities. We are dedicated to including those currently under represented in heritage, creating opportunities for shared storytelling, and extending the benefits of heritage to all.

Monitoring and evaluation will be developed against the actions to track progress and the actions will be monitored through the Council’s internal Heritage Forum with bi-annual updates to the Council.

The Council’s Heritage Stakeholder Group will be drawn from organisations in the sector and stakeholders including but not limited to: Statutory Agencies, Education, Community Groups and Heritage Organisations and Groups.


The Heritage Plan is not a reflection of activity but a strategic roadmap for the future, reinforcing our ongoing dedication


