## Tackling Deprivation in Enniskillen

Tackling Deprivation in Enniskillen Action Plan was developed through a process instigated by the Department for Communities (formally known as the Department of Social Development) in August 2014. The aim of the planning process was to develop an Action Plan with a primary economic development and regeneration focus for areas of deprivation in Enniskillen. The Action Plan is reviewed on an ongoing basis but is formally reviewed by the NR Partnership annually. It delivers for the present, looks forward to the future and reflects ongoing work within the Neighbourhood Renewal Area of Enniskillen

The Action Plan was developed by the Enniskillen Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership which was established as a vehicle for local planning and delivery and includes: political representatives, statutory agencies, community/voluntary sector and the private sector. Member Organisations include Fermanagh & Omagh District Council, Department for Communities, Department for Infrastructure, Policing and Community Safety Partnership, Northern Ireland Housing Executive, Police Service of Northern Ireland, Supporting Communities, Action for Children, Western Health and Social Care Trust, Education Authority (West Region) Youth Service and South West College.

Regardless of where a deprived area is located it will inherently have similar problems. For example, higher than average rates of unemployment, physical and mental ill health, lower levels of educational attainment, higher rates of crime and problems with quality and maintenance of the environment.

The main goal of the Action Plan is to help map the means as to how the Partnership intend to close the gap between the quality of life for people in the most deprived neighbourhoods and the quality of life for the rest of society by ensuring the following:

1. People living in the most deprived neighbourhoods have access to the best possible services and to the opportunities which make for a better quality of life and prospects for themselves and their families.
2. Improve the environment and image of our most deprived neighbourhoods so that they become attractive places to live, work and invest in.

This Action Plan also seeks to address the four strategic objectives:-

1. **Community Renewal:** “To develop confident communities who are able and committed to improving the quality of life in their area”.
2. **Social Renewal** – “To improve social conditions for the people who live in the most deprived neighbourhoods, through better co-ordinated public services and the creation of safer environments”
3. **Economic Renewal** - ‘To develop economic activity in the most deprived neighbourhoods and connect them to the wider urban economy’
4. **Physical Renewal:** - “To help create attractive, safe, sustainable environments in the most deprived neighbourhoods”

The Enniskillen Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership undertook a review of the Action Plan in November 2017 to seek to improve the social, economic and environmental conditions of their area by:

- Identifying evidence based needs;
- Detailing and prioritising the needs of the area that are to be met;
- Detailing and prioritising the activities to meet that need; and
- Advising the needs of the area that are to be met.

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## Strategic Objective: Economic Renewal

**Aim: To develop economic activity in the most deprived neighbourhoods and connect them to the wider urban economy.**

Outcome: Our economy is thriving, expanding and outward looking.





In Fermanagh and Omagh District Council 86% self-reported their health to be either 'very good' or 'good' – note that the comparative figure for Northern Ireland is 80%. (Fermanagh and Omagh District Council Residents Survey 2018).

There were a total of 10 registered deaths by suicide for young people across Northern Ireland in 2018. The graph shows that over the last 5 years the highest number of suicides in the 0-18 year old age group were registered in 2012. It is important to note that the coroner's office indicates that the number of suicides recorded is likely to be inaccurate, as in some cases coroners are unwilling to register "death by suicide," primarily due to respect for the wishes of the family. - 1. Promote better access to counselling support, including support for those suffering from sexual abuse.**
- 2. Provision of Stress management and resilience tools to all NR residents.**
- 3. Support activities to address social isolation including opportunities to volunteer.**
- 4. Support the communities to respond to poor mental health issues in their areas.**
- 5. To explore collaborative approaches to providing interventions that address the increasing demand for health and wellbeing services including the Fermanagh and Omagh Community Plan and supporting Pathfinder.**




**Figure 1.8 Fermanagh and Omagh District Council by DEA level Primary 1 pupils overweight and obese (2013/14 to 2017/18)**





**% of children who are obese, 2012/13 - 2014/15**



In Fermanagh and Omagh 68% of residents said that in a typical week they undertake a total of 30 minutes or more physical activity at least one day a week, with 32% not active at all in a given week. (Fermanagh and Omagh District Council Residents Survey 2018)



In NI at March 2019 16.29% of P1 children were overweight – this is a slight increase from March 2018. In NI 5.53% of P1 children were obese, the highest rate since 2015/16. (Northern Ireland Outcome Monitoring Report with Trends 12-16/17).

In 2016/2017, according to Northern Ireland Substance Misuse Database (SMD), of those clients receiving help for problem alcohol use, over two thirds were male and 44% of clients reported daily alcohol consumption. In 2013/14, of those adults surveyed in the Northern Ireland Health Survey, 16% of those living in Northern Ireland drink above the recommended sensible drinking guideline. A comparative figure for LGD is not available (NINIS area profile report 29 November 2017).







Percentage of Young People Leaving School with no GCSEs in NI




The Story Behind the Trends – The percentage of young people leaving school with no GCSEs in NI has fallen from 1.8% in June 12 to 0.7% in June 19. There were a total of 158 young people

leaving school with no GCSEs in 2018/19 – 96 boys and 62 girls. (Northern Ireland Outcome Monitoring Report with Trends 12-16/17).

The statistics below highlight that the population from areas of deprivation in Enniskillen are less likely to have the same level of educational attainment than other areas.

**Fermanagh and Omagh/Comparison with Northern Ireland**

In 2015/16 Academic Year, **69.6%** of school leavers in **Fermanagh and Omagh** LGD achieved at least 5 GCSEs at A\*-C or equivalent, including GCSE English and Maths. This compared with **67.7%** overall in Northern Ireland.







The dialogue accompanying some drawings has been evaluated and analysed to provide a more in depth view. 






Physical health and wellbeing as the key number one priority. 44 pupils identified Outcome 6 - Connectivity including road, broadband and mobile phones as the second priority. The third identified was Outcome 7- the Natural environment and built and cultural heritage. Table 1: below gives a broader overview of all the results for each outcome in relation to all 158 participants and 202 priorities. The dialogue accompanying some drawings has been evaluated and analysed to provide a more in depth view. Alignment to 15 actions in the Community Plan Action Plan (out of a possible 53) has been identified and this is outlined in Table 2 opposite. The actions have been ranked in order of priority.

### Community Plan 'Fermanagh and Omagh 2030'

The YLT survey is undertaken annually and uses the Child Benefit Register as a random sample frame. In 2019 all young people living in Northern Ireland who celebrated their 16<sup>th</sup> birthday from January - March 2019 were invited to take part in the survey. The survey was completed by 1,171 respondents.
