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CHAIRPERSON FOREWORD- Councillor John Coyle

I have great pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for the Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership (PCSP) 2017-2018.

As Chair I am delighted to have represented the PCSP at numerous events. These include the launch of the RAPID Bins initiative, Bee Safe and Road Traffic Collision demonstrations delivered in post primary schools.

This past year has been another busy year for the PCSP. In terms of community safety, the PCSP Action Plan for 2017-2018 focused on the following themes reflecting the issues raised by the local community:

- Road Safety
- Crime and the Fear of Crime
- Domestic and Sexual Violence
- Anti-Social Behaviour

Key achievements in the delivery of the 2017-2018 Action Plan include continued support for the Neighbourhood Watch Schemes, collaboration with the emergency services to deliver Road Traffic Demonstrations to post primary schools, installation of three RAPID Bins, delivery of the Community Safety Warden Scheme and domestic and sexual violence awareness raising initiatives.

The PCSP was delighted to roll out the PCSP small grants scheme. Through the scheme, the PCSP supported several initiatives such as diversionary activities at Hallowe'en, road safety projects and community first aid. The scheme is an important mechanism allowing local groups to access funding to address identified need at a local level.

The PCSP continues to consult and engage with the local community on issues that impact on policing and community safety. We undertook numerous consultation and engagement events across the district, a way of both promoting the work of the PCSP and gathering views and opinions on policing and community safety issues.

This year we embraced social media with the launch of our Facebook page where we promote the work of the PCSP, our designated partners and others whom have a remit in policing and community safety. We are delighted with the feedback we have received and find this a very useful tool in reaching out to the wider community spreading the message of the PCSP.

The move to Outcomes Based Accountability has posed many challenges for the PCSP members and staff. However, the ability to quantify and measure the difference that the PCSP initiatives have made to local people and communities is invaluable in measuring the success of PCSPs and in determining future priorities.

Our work through the Policing Committee to monitor the performance of the Police has been greatly boosted through enhanced reporting structure through which we are able to gain a greater understanding of the story behind the statistics. In this respect I would like to record our thanks, on behalf of the PCSP, to Inspector Clive Beatty for working with the Members to agree and implement a revised reporting structure.



Looking forward there are many challenges facing PCSPs; raising the profile of PCSPs and increasing confidence in policing in the light of ever increasing budgetary and resource deployment constraints. We are confident that the first three years of the Fermanagh and Omagh PCSP have laid the foundations for an effective representative PCSP going forward ensuring continued delivery for all our communities.

I wish to express sincere thanks to all the Members of the PCSP who have demonstrated their commitment to the PCSP through their professionalism and support. Thanks also to the local PSNI team for its continued support of the work of the PCSP. Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership includes a dynamic group of people from a variety of backgrounds and experiences, with everyone playing their part to make our district a safer place for those who live, work, visit or invest in.

Thanks also go to the PCSP staff for their hard work and support during my tenure. I trust that we can continue to rise to the many challenges still ahead of us but with the ultimate goal in sight of making the Fermanagh and Omagh District Council area a safe and thriving community for all who choose to make it their home.





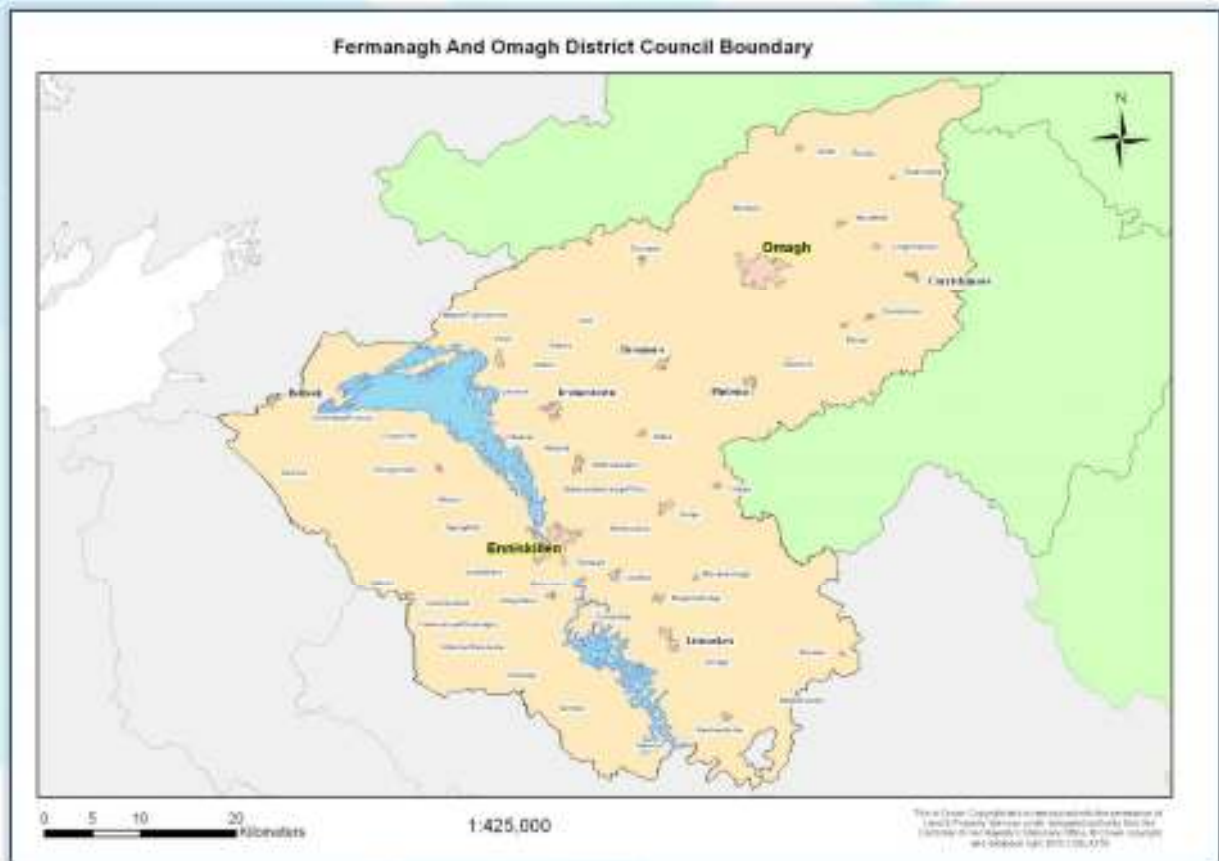

PROFILE OF THE FERMANAGH & OMAGH DISTRICT COUNCIL AREA

The Fermanagh and Omagh district spans approximately 3,000 km² and is home to 115,000 people. The district is the largest in Northern Ireland in terms of land mass and the smallest in terms of population, with a population density of 38 people per square kilometre.

Fermanagh and Omagh is primarily rural; approximately 30% of the population live in the two main towns of Enniskillen and Omagh. A further 7% live in the towns of Carrickmore, Dromore, Fintona, Irvinestown and Lisnaskea. The villages and small settlements account for a further 17% of the population, with 46% of people living in open countryside.

Lough Erne, the fourth largest lake in Ireland, is full encompassed within the district. Part of the Sperrin Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) also sits within the district, as does UNESCO Marble Arch Caves Global Geopark.



THE FERMANAGH & OMAGH COMMUNITY PLAN

The Fermanagh and Omagh 2030 Community Plan, published in March 2017, is an overarching strategy which sets out the roadmap for the improvement of services and quality of life for the district by getting the public, private and community/voluntary sectors working together better towards a shared vision and eight long term outcomes.

The Action Plan sets out the initial partnership actions to be taken towards achieving the agreed outcomes. The actions included are those which will help to jointly tackle the major issues in the district which require a high level of partnership working to achieve with a focus, where possible, on prevention and early intervention. Delivering on these actions will bring added value to the core work of each of the individual partners, thereby effecting added benefits for citizens and service users.

Shared outcomes: the following outcomes are expressions of the results the Community Plan wishes to achieve for all people in Fermanagh and Omagh:

Within the People and Communities Theme the Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership is the identified action lead for:

- **3:1** Maintain and extend the Neighbourhood Watch Initiative
- **3:2** Investigate initiatives and develop programmes to deliver early warning communications aimed at preventing incidents of crime

The PCSP is a support partner to several other actions namely:

- **3:3** Explore further opportunities to increase positive engagement between young people and the Police Service of Northern Ireland, Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service and other emergency services.
- **3:4** Increase awareness of and work to improve/increase capacity to support those at risk of domestic and sexual abuse.
- **3:5** Develop/extend initiatives to prevent and increase awareness of cyber-crime and cyber-bullying.
- **3:11** Deliver road safety programmes across a range of age groups.

The Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership has worked extensively with public, private and community/voluntary organisations in the development of the Community Plan and looks forward to moving to the implementation stage.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY 1:

TO SUCCESSFULLY DELIVER THE FUNCTIONS OF THE POLICING AND COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP

In 2017-2018 there were three private PCSP meetings and two themed public PCSP meetings. The themes for the two public PCSP meetings - workshop on changes to local policing facilitated by Queen's University Belfast and scams awareness presentation delivered by the Consumer Council for Northern Ireland were identified in response to the feedback from ongoing district wide engagement and awareness activity. In the latter half of the year the Partnership reviewed the impact and effectiveness of themed public meetings and going forward in 2018-2019 will implement a more considered approach to animating the public and raising awareness of the PCSP.

Throughout the year the Members availed of training and development opportunities such as Outcomes Based Accountability which guided the Members through the process of developing the Action Plan for 2018-2019.

Ascertaining the pertinent community safety and policing issues in the community is pivotal to the work of the PCSP in seeking to address such needs and concerns. In this respect the PCSP Members take their responsibility very seriously and throughout the year undertook a series of engagement events such as Hats off to Forthill, the Omagh show and the Fermanagh County Show. The questionnaire was revised to have a less formal structured approach and to comply with General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) where no unnecessary information is gathered. The more relaxed format facilitates a conversation which the Members have found to be very informative in learning about community safety and policing issues.

The opportunity to participate in best practice workshops organised by the Joint Committee greatly enhanced the Member's understanding of the work of PCSPs elsewhere. The Fermanagh and Omagh PCSP was invited, in collaboration with the Mid Ulster PCSP, to showcase the Crash Car Simulator Project at the road safety workshop held in March 2018.

The Members recognise and appreciate the work of the various agencies, organisations and individuals that assist the working of the PCSP. As a mark of appreciation and to celebrate the work of the PCSP a Jingle and Mingle event was held in December 2017. This brought together key stakeholders such as Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinators, project delivery agents and the Members to share their work and celebrate achievements.

FACEBOOK

Responding to the need expressed by the Members for the PCSP to have a social media presence the Fermanagh and Omagh PCSP Facebook page was launched in summer 2017. This page provides details on PCSP events and community safety information.

Tyred and tested for winter roads

Winter road conditions were also being considered by Farnborough & Oseagh PCSP who hosted a series of tyre safety events in Oseagh and Enniskillen.

Working in conjunction with the PSNI Road Safe NI and the Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service, the events at local ASDA stores saw officers from the PSNI Roadside Policing Unit carry out winter safety checks for motorists. Officers were provided with safety helmets and foggers so officers could check the tread depth on their tyres.

Neighbourhood Watch coordinators in the know in Fermanagh and Omagh

Fermanagh & Omagh PCOP has hosted two 'Knowledge Night' for Neighbourhood Watch coordinators. The events, which took place in a comfortable and snug Puff station, were aimed at giving practical advice on locking crime and making communities safer and to update participants on future PSM initiatives in the district. Coordinators also got an insight into the work of mobile policing and saw a demonstration of a car crash simulator, one of many joint initiatives between the PSNI and PCOP to address road safety.

Neighbourhood Watch is a voluntary and free of charge crime prevention scheme. It encourages people to be good, neighbourly and vigilant communities.

Cage soccer tackles anti-social behaviour

A portable soccer cage aimed at tackling anti-social behaviour has arrived with community groups across the Forthmouth and Dungeness areas.

A series of football training sessions have been delivered by the PCSF agency alongside Central Police staff, using the cages to develop individual skills, game tactics, set pieces in football and goalkeeping techniques.

The soccer cage is available to community-based organisations across the region for free. It can be used to ensure that anti-expressing and social behaviour is combated, ensuring a safe, safe and enjoyable playing field.

Bin the drugs

Fermapack & Omega PCSP and partners have expanded the use of drug bins in the area. Following a pilot in 2010, the idea of installing the **RAPID** bins to Remove All Prescription and Illegal Drugs has developed with three more in Emswiler, Irindown and Omega.

Delivered by the PCSP the PSRA, the Public Health Agency, ABCRT and Fermapack and Omega Drug and Alcohol Futures, the scheme provides a safe way for anyone to dispose of drugs. The PCSP Community Safety Workers promote the project across the district and regularly inspect the bins and the PSRA are responsible for collecting and disposing of the drugs.

PCSP Chair Cllr John Gyles said about the project: **"The PCSP engage with local community and statutory groups to identify and address concerns in relation to community safety and prepare a plan to address these concerns. The focus of the plan is on delivering practical solutions and RAPID bins are an excellent example of this practical interagency approach."**



Pupils schooled in reality of road traffic collisions



As part of its activity for Road Safety Week, Farnborough & Oseagh PCSP also supported a programme of road traffic collision simulations in local schools. Along with the PSNI, MERS and the Ambulance Service, members of the PCSP were at Dúnghing Integrated College in Oseagh and Devenish College in Enniskillen to provide the hard-hitting, real time simulations which demonstrated the possible repercussions of accidents for young drivers and their passengers. Students from St John's Business College, Drogheda and Dean Maguire College, Carrickmore were also in attendance at the events.

Mid Ulster PCSP also held a Roadside Roadblock, this time in Danganoo/Laneau Centre. The road safety show was welcomed to over 500 onlookers aged 17 and 18 from post primary schools in Danganoo and Cookstown. The shocking simulations help young people understand the consequences of being involved in a serious or fatal road traffic collision, showing the fact that they are not a risk of becoming involved in a collision at the start of their motoring life.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY 2:

TO IMPROVE COMMUNITY SAFETY BY TACKLING ACTUAL AND PERCEIVED CRIME AND ANIT-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

Most of the resources of the PCSP are directed to the delivery of Strategic Priority 2 which reflects the strategic priorities of the Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership addressing the identified needs of the local community:

- Road Safety
- Domestic and Sexual Violence
- Crime and the Fear of Crime
- Anti-social Behaviour


The actions detailed in Strategic Priority 2 take account of crime and anti-social behaviour hot spots and are designed to be imaginative and flexible in response to issues as they arise.






In the delivery of the Action Plan the PCSP works closely with designated member organisations and also those who contribute to community safety in their particular field such as the RNLI.


A dedicated working group oversees the delivery of each of the strategic priorities. Each working group is made up of the PCSP Members with key stakeholders such as the PSNI, Road Safe NI and Omagh Chamber of Commerce. These working groups meet on at least a quarterly basis and are instrumental in planning for the various initiatives for each strategic priority.

To avoid any unnecessary duplication and more efficient use of resources the Fermanagh and Omagh PCSP is represented on the Western Domestic and Sexual Violence Partnership at sub group and regional level. This has allowed for a more strategic approach to the PCSP's work related to domestic and sexual violence and building of relationships across the sector.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY 3:

TO SUPPORT COMMUNITY CONFIDENCE IN POLICING

The Policing Committee is responsible for enhancing public confidence in policing through its work in monitoring police performance in the delivery of the Local Policing Plan, ensuring that policing services are delivered for local communities. A copy of the Fermanagh and Omagh Local Policing Plan 2017-2018 can be found in Appendix C.

This Committee of the PCSP has an important role of oversight for local policing and gaining the co-operation of the public with the police in preventing crime and enhancing community safety within the district.

Fermanagh and Omagh PCSP Policing Committee fulfilled its obligation to hold two public meetings and four private meetings in the year. These meetings were an opportunity for an open exchange of views and opinions on local policing and for the Chief Inspector to present up to date crime statistics and PSNI developments going forward. The Policing Committee was also used as a forum to update the Members, and at public meetings the public, about new initiatives such as body worn cameras and Public Protection Arrangements.

The Policing Matters Seminar Series allowed the Members to learn about various policing initiatives in Northern Ireland and the mainland that impact or if implemented have the potential to impact on their role in monitoring the Local Policing Plan.

In developing the Local Policing Plan for 2017-2018 the Chief Inspector liaised closely with the Policing Committee Members to ensure that the Plan offered an effective response to local identified need.

Central to the monitoring of the oversight of the implementation of the Local Policing Plan was the implementation of the PSNI Community Engagement Strategy. Engagement is about building lasting relationships with communities, to work in collaboration to help build a safe, confident and peaceful society. The Engagement Strategy has nine areas of work:

- Victim Update and Support
- Community Engagement
- Anti-Social Behaviour
- Hate Crime and Incidents
- Domestic Abuse
- Vulnerability
- Crime
- Road Safety
- Drugs

The Chief Inspector reported to the Policing Committee each quarter on the delivery of the Local Policing Plan and the Engagement Strategy through a bespoke reporting structure detailing statistical performance along with a narrative telling the story behind the statistics and updates on the roll out of the Engagement Strategy. This revised reporting structure enabled the Members to gain a greater understanding of the challenges facing the PSNI to manage the process of reactive work through calls for service and proactive community engagement and resulting from this to challenge the PSNI where it was thought performance could be enhanced. The Policing Committee Report for the period 1 April 2017 – 18 March 2018 can be found in Appendix D.

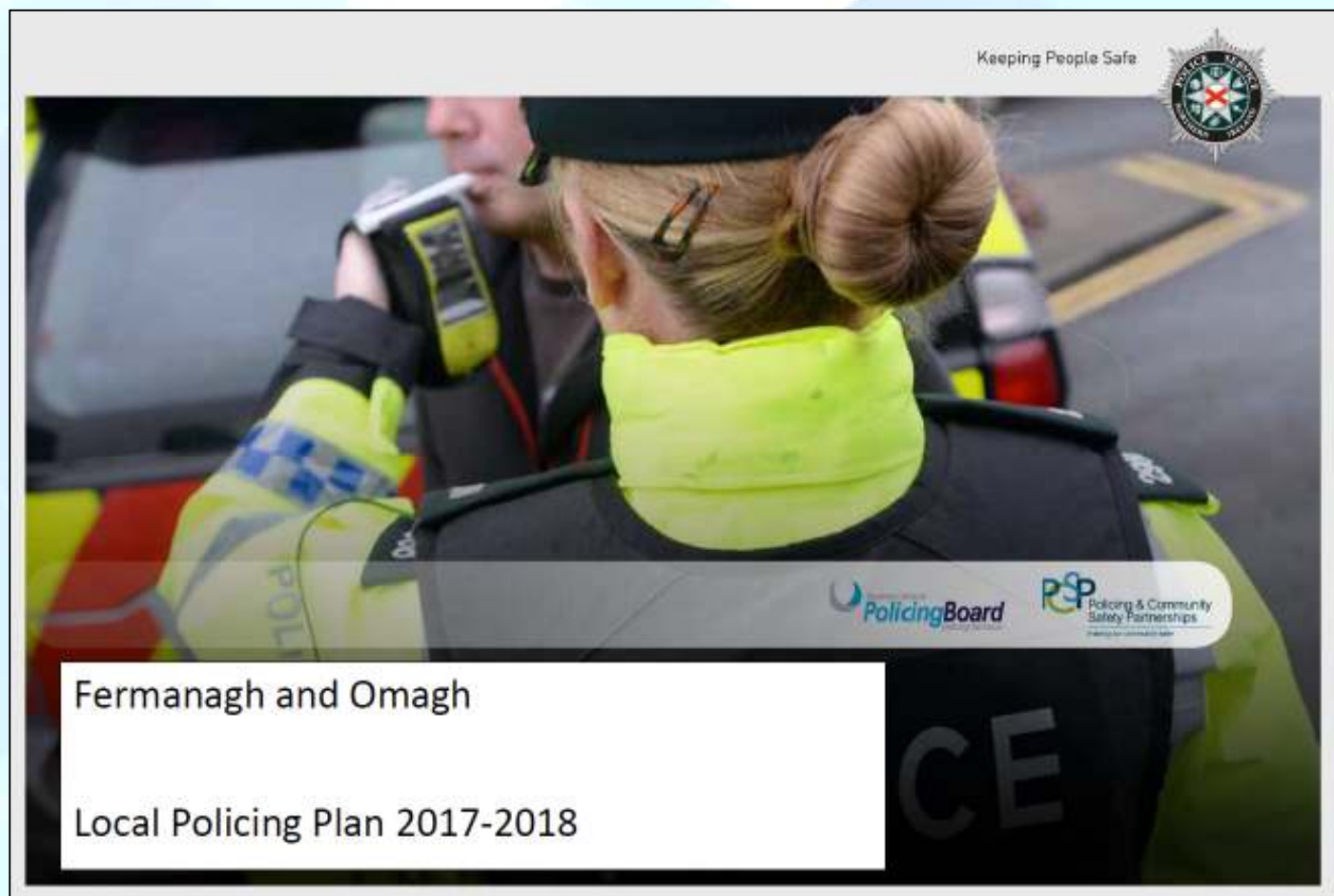

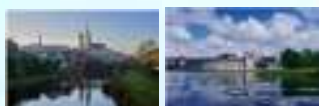

Executive Summary:

Victim Update and Support - 98.6% of the 4119 victims of crime in Fermanagh and Omagh have received an update within the 10 day target. This is up from 94.2% for the same period last financial year. We continue to support victims through their ordeal and have started using more voluntary agencies to assist us.

Community Engagement – Local Officers continue to build relationships within their Personal Areas of Responsibility, with much focus being on the younger community and those that may be vulnerable. Dedicated Engagement Patrols take place on a minimum of 4 days per week right across the District, which allows officers to concentrate on building relationships and working in collaboration with the community.

Anti-Social Behaviour – We have 2604 incidents of ASB recorded between 01 April 2017 and 18 March 2018, which is **up** by 152 incidents from the same time last year. Traditional ASB seems to be on the decrease with digital ASB (texting, social media etc.) on the increase.

Hate Crime – from 01 April 2017 to 18th March 2018 we have recorded 31 Hate Crimes; which is **26 less** than the same time last year. Great work is being done with Ethnic Minority Groups' across the District, which is improving relationships and increasing confidence.

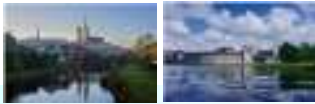
Domestic Abuse – Domestic related crime continues to fall with 718 Domestically Motivated Crimes recorded between 01 April 2017 and 18 March 2018, which is **down 19** crimes from the same time last year. Some great work is being done in collaboration with Women's Aid and Active Listening and other statutory agencies to help those affected by Domestic Abuse.

Vulnerability – Officers across the District are working hard to engage with all types of vulnerable persons, to ensure that we reduce crime and the fear of crime and build a better, stronger community. Excellent work is being done with the schools to raise awareness of internet safety, which includes cyber-crime and cyber-bullying.

Crime – 4119 crimes have been recorded this financial year; that is **393** crimes less than last year. This represents a 8.7% drop in crime, which is good news but there is still much work to be done by everyone in the community to work together to reduce the opportunity for crimes to occur and we cannot rest on our laurels!

Road Safety – 6 people have lost their lives on the Fermanagh and Omagh roads this financial year, which is 6 lives too many. Officers across the District continue to educate and enforce but we can never do enough to stop the devastation that the loss of life on our roads brings to a community. 1519 Motoring offences have been prosecuted through the courts this financial year, of which 197 have been prosecuted through the courts for Careless Driving and 91 for Dangerous Driving. A further 895 Fixed Penalty Tickets have been issued up to the end of December 2017. 3409 people have been breathalysed so far this year.

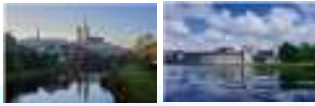
Drugs – in the last 12 months there have been 197 drugs arrest, 303 seizures in the District, and 44 people were charged to court.

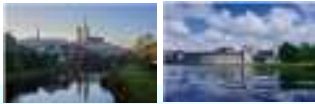

Sergeant Hamill of Omagh Neighbourhood is spearheading Facebook Live sessions on the last Thursday of each month, where the community can ask questions via Facebook and we will endeavour to answer them within the two hour slot.</p> <p>We are introducing Monthly Engagement Themes for the coming year, where officers right across the district, will, among other things, focus on one or two elements of the Local Policing Plan for that month. This will be complemented by media awareness, Facebook live sessions, radio interviews and then each month a report will be produced on what the theme was and what we did throughout the month. This report will then form part of the PCSP report going forward.</p>

Some great work is being done in collaboration with Women's Aid and Active Listening and other statutory Agencies to help those affected by Domestic Abuse.</p> <p>Volunteers from Women's Aid at both Enniskillen and Omagh attended Omagh and Enniskillen Police stations over a 5 week period, in order to engage with officers, educate officers, build relationships with officers to ensure all officers are aware of the role of Womens Aid and how they can assist each other in relation to the issue of Domestic Abuse. Officers always did but now work even closer with Women's Aid and are able to ensure that victims receive the best possible support in these difficult times.</p> <p>Police have continually raised this issue on their Social Media page and have received positive feedback in relation to the work we are doing to tackle this issue. The idea was to provide practical crime prevention advice to retailers and retail assistants helping them to protect their stock; identify counterfeit currency and assist us with providing Early Accurate Reports – and be our EARs on the ground. FODC assisted with the provision of a venue and sending out a broadcast text or e-mail to all of the local shop and business owners. The low number of retail thefts reported was a positive outcome and Police were able to further develop relations and contacts with the local retailers. Ring master has also been re-launched and the uptake has been very positive with 100% of retailers having signed up to receive advice and alerts.</p> <p>On Sunday 11/02/2018 Police ran a multi-agency Search & Rescue Exercise on Lower Lough Erne as part of general preparedness for incidents in & around Lough Erne. Police Boats, RNLI & North West Mountain Rescue joined forces to deal with a simulated exercise on Inish Davan. Agencies assembled at Rossigh Public Jetty and staged the response from there. The snow and freezing conditions added to the realism of the day in which all 3 agencies worked very well together and several important learning points were identified.</p> <p>On 7th March Police responded to a concern for safety call which culminated in officers ‘talking’ an individual down from a roof top who was suffering from a serious mental health episode. Officers dealt compassionately with the person who was taken into medical care once removed from danger by officers. The officers remained calm & focused in what was a very delicate & dangerous situation and managed to ensure the safety of this vulnerable person.</p> <p>On Saturday 24th March Police and Northern Ireland Fire & Rescue Service took part in a multi-agency exercise with RNLI at Inish Rath simulating a fire & evacuation of the island. 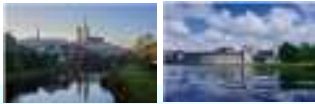

This represents a 8.7% drop in crime, which is good news but there is still much work to be done by everyone in the community to work together to reduce the opportunity for crimes to occur and we cannot rest on our laurels!</p> <p>17/10/2017 and 28th of October 2017 police conducted a trailer marking event at Corraglass Road following issues with rural crime in the area – over 20 trailers were marked.</p> <p><u>CRIME</u> 3/11/17- Report of high value theft of Hitachi Digger in Omagh. Following a successful social media appeal, the digger was subsequently recovered in Portadown.</p> <p>A number of officers in the District have attended a rural livestock course, where they have spoken with local farmers and DRD officials in order to gain a better insight and understanding into rural crime.</p> <p>Operation Snowflake commenced on 01 December, producing numerous beat patrols in main towns in District on the run up to Christmas. The idea behind the increased level of visibility was to increase confidence and deter or detect crime. Feedback from traders has been very positive and early indications suggest crime levels have dropped over this period.</p> <p><i>In partnership with other agencies work to raise awareness of agricultural and rural crime</i></p> <p>On 18th November 2017 officers from Enniskillen carried out a trailer/machinery marking event in Garrison. 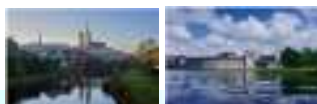

A further 895 Fixed Penalty Tickets have been issued up to the end of December 2017. 3409 people have been breathalysed so far this year.</p> <p>Fermanagh Officers attended the Integrated College, Enniskillen to carry out a Laser Op with Year 13 students. The two session involved discussion & training with students around Road Safety & Excess Speed, which was then followed by police enforcement involving a session on the road where students were given the opportunity to use the speed detection equipment and speak to motorists in the presence of police. The students enjoyed the experience, which feedback indicated will help them appreciate the dangers of the road in coming months when they begin driving themselves.</p> <p>Traffic Management colleagues & Transport NI met on the A4 at Brookeborough to discuss the A4 Station Rd & Greenhill Road Junctions as there are concerns about these junctions in terms of KSI collisions. Remedial measures were identified, which Transport NI will consider.</p> <p>Officers in Enniskillen have been active with speed detection equipment on the Dublin Road, where the traffic lanes merge. Detections were made for excess speed. This is a problematic area but efforts to change driving patterns will continue.</p> <p>Officers in Omagh carried out proactive Road Traffic work at St Conor's PS, Omagh where parking leaflets were distributed to motorists in a bid to help School Management & Staff deal with parking issues in the area of the school.</p> <p>Fermanagh Neighbourhood Team assisted with Road Safety and accompanied kids from Ekn Nursery on a school walk. Officers also presented certificated to children who took part.</p> <p>On 23rd January Fermanagh Neighbourhood Team attended the Road Safety Roadshow Quiz at the Killyhevlin Hotel. P5s from across Fermanagh attended a road safety event organised by Roadsaf NI who we work closely with.</p> <p>On Wed 7th February a productive meeting took place between Police & Transport NI to examine traffic and parking issues in the Belmore Street & Dublin Roads on Enniskillen.</p> <p>Police in Lisnaskea carried out a 4 day road safety Op along the A4 which was very positively received by the public and was beneficial in educating them. Local Policing Plan Measures	<p>PSNI Narrative - To report to PCSP on initiatives that help achieve an increase in the amount of drugs detections and seizures</p> <p>In the last 12 months there have been 197 drugs arrest, 303 seizures in the District, and 44 people were charged to court.</p> <p>Police continue to use a range of disposals such as the drugs and alcohol awareness course in order to educate and rehabilitate offenders.</p> <p>Intelligence is the lifeblood of any police service, which as a result of gaining intelligence from the community; we conducted over 100 planned drug searches this financial year.</p> <p>In October Police conducted a search of a house in Lisnaskea and seized approximately £250 worth of class A and B drugs. The householder was arrested for drugs offences.</p> <p>In early November officers in Omagh stopped a vehicle acting suspiciously and conducted a search, locating approximately £1,000 of cannabis resin. The suspect was arrested and vehicle was seized. He is currently on bail.</p> <p>In November a van was stopped in Omagh and a search conducted. Approximately £8,000 of Cocaine was seized. The suspect was arrested, charged and remanded in custody. The suspect resides outside of the jurisdiction and a Police are liaising closely with our Garda colleagues.</p> <p>In Mid-November following a vehicle acting suspiciously in Lisbellaw, a search was conducted and Police seized a quantity of class A and B drugs. A further search was conducted of a house, resulting in further drug & cash seizures. Two suspects were arrested and are currently on bail.</p> <p>Police continue to work with ASCERT and the Education Authority to provide Alcohol/ Drugs Awareness Courses for first time offenders identified committing minor offences (adult & Youth).</p> <p>Police conducted a search of a property in the Hillview area of Enniskillen. A man and a woman aged in their 30s have been arrested on suspicion of possession and possession with intent to supply and being concerned in the supply of both Class A and Class B drugs.</p>

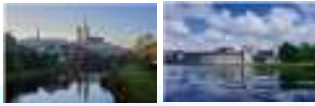

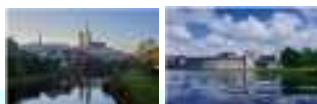

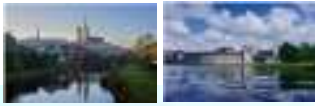
