CHAIRPERSON FOREWORD- Councillor Allan Rainey MBE

I have great pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for the Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership (PCSP) 2018-2019.

As Chair I am delighted to have represented the PCSP at numerous events. These include the Roadsafes Roadshow, Emergency Services Day and Bee Safe.

This past year has been another busy year for the PCSP. In terms of community safety, the PCSP Action Plan for 2018-2019 focused on the following themes reflecting the issues raised by the local community:

- Road Safety
- Crime and the Fear of Crime
- Domestic and Sexual Violence
- Anti-Social Behaviour

Key achievements in the delivery of the 2018-2019 Action Plan include continued support for the Neighbourhood Watch Schemes, collaboration with the emergency services to host an Emergency Services Day showcasing the work the emergency services to keep people safe, installation of two more RAPID Bins, continued delivery of the Community Safety Warden Scheme and two seminars focused on raising awareness of domestic and sexual violence.

This year, in addition to the small grants scheme, we rolled out Participatory Budgeting (PB) in two electoral areas in the district. PB is an innovative process which enables people to have direct decision-making powers over the allocation of resources in their community in a way that is fair and transparent. We are delighted with the positive response from the community and plan to make this a feature of PCSP delivery going forward. Through small grants we supported road safety, first aid training, safety marshalling training projects.

The PCSP continues to consult and engage with the local community on issues impacting on policing and community safety. The views and opinions of the community inform the work of the PCSP ensuring that we are responsive to local need. Wishing to be as accessible and transparent as possible the Members decided that all meetings of the PCSP and the Policing Committee are held in public in venues around the district. We continue to encourage the public to attend PCSP and Policing Committee meetings to share their views and concerns.

Our following on the PCSP facebook page continues to grow. We use facebook to promote the work of the PCSP, our designated partners and others whom have a remit in community safety. We continue to exploit opportunities to promote the work of the PCSP and disseminating community safety information.

As Chair I was delighted to represent the PCSP at the six-month governance meeting where we can engage with the Joint Committee and see how the work of the PCSP fits with regional strategies and initiatives.

We continue to embed Outcomes Based Accountability into the day to day operation of the PCSP and have used OBA to develop and inform the 2019-2022 Strategic Plan. The ability to quantify and measure the difference that the PCSP initiatives have made to local people and communities is invaluable in measuring the success of PCSPs and in determining future priorities.

Through the Policing Committee we have responsibility to monitor Police performance of the delivery of the Local Policing Plan. This monitoring function is so much more than reviewing







PROFILE OF THE FERMANAGH & OMAGH DISTRICT COUNCIL AREA

The Fermanagh and Omagh district spans approximately 3,000 km² and is home to 115,000 people. The district is the largest in Northern Ireland in terms of land mass and the smallest in terms of population, with a population density of 38 people per square kilometre.

Fermanagh and Omagh is primarily rural; approximately 30% of the population live in the two main towns of Enniskillen and Omagh. A further 7% live in the towns of Carrickmore, Dromore, Fintona, Irvinestown and Lisnaskea. The villages and small settlements account for a further 17% of the population, with 46% of people living in open countryside.

Lough Erne, the fourth largest lake in Ireland, is full encompassed within the district. Part of the Sperrin Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) also sits within the district, as does UNESCO Marble Arch Caves Global Geopark.



THE FERMANAGH & OMAGH COMMUNITY PLAN

The Fermanagh and Omagh 2030 Community Plan is an overarching strategy which sets out the roadmap for the improvement of services and quality of life for the district by getting the public, private and community/voluntary sectors working together better towards a shared vision and eight long term outcomes.

The Action Plan sets out the initial partnership actions to be taken towards achieving the agreed outcomes. The actions included are those which will help to jointly tackle the major issues in the district which require a high level of partnership working to achieve with a focus, where possible, on prevention and early intervention. Delivering on these actions will bring added value to the core work of each of the individual partners, thereby effecting added benefits for citizens and service users.

Shared outcomes: the following outcomes are expressions of the results the Community Plan wishes to achieve for all people in Fermanagh and Omagh:

Within the People and Communities Theme the Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership is the action lead for:

- **3:2** Investigate initiatives and develop programmes to deliver early warning communications aimed at preventing incidents of crime

The PCSP is a support partner to several other actions namely:

- **3:3** Explore further opportunities to increase positive engagement between young people and the Police Service of Northern Ireland, Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service and other emergency services.
- **3:4** Increase awareness of and work to improve/increase capacity to support those at risk of domestic and sexual abuse.
- **3:5** Develop/extend initiatives to prevent and increase awareness of cyber-crime and cyber-bullying.
- **3:11** Deliver road safety programmes across a range of age groups.

The Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership is working with partners in the delivery of actions in the Community Plan reporting on activity as required.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY 1:

TO SUCCESSFULLY DELIVER THE FUNCTIONS OF THE POLICING AND COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP

Wishing to ensure that the PCSP is as accessible and accountable as possible to the local community that it serves the Members took the decision to hold all meetings of the PCSP and the Policing Committee in public. Where feasible these meetings to be held in community venues outside of the main towns of Enniskillen and Omagh. Alongside this the PCSP implemented a less formal approach to its themed meetings moving away from presentations to engagement events, such as the Speed Awareness/Road Safety event in Teemore in June, held in communities where there was a specific issue highlighted. This less formal and localised approach facilitates more engagement and interaction between the community and the PCSP.

Throughout the year the Members availed of training and development opportunities offered by the Joint Committee such as Outcomes Based Accountability as well as those organised by the PCSP such as the Bystander and drug and alcohol awareness training. Members also received presentations from Crimestoppers, Public Protection Branch and Omagh Youth Council.

Communicating to others about the work of the PCSP is essential to raising the profile of the PCSP in this respect the PCSP was proactive in using local print media, facebook and Inpartnership to publicise and promote its work. This was complemented by face to face engagement at community events, big and small, around the district. Such engagement is crucial in gathering information about community safety and policing issues that inform PCSP delivery throughout the year. This year the PCSP received more invitations than ever to attend community events such as 1st Derrylin Scouts Fun Day and a visit to Roslea Community Playgroup. These events also serve to break down perceived barriers to engagement with the PSNI as where possible PSNI officers also attend. The Members are very much aware of the importance of ongoing community engagement to ensure that the work of the PCSP reflects local identified need and is flexible to reflect emerging trends throughout the year.

Members participated in the inspection of the Policing and Community Safety Partnerships (PCSPs) undertaken by the Criminal Justice Inspectorate (CJI). The Members also participated in the Local Policing Review and hosted a public consultation event in the district.

Conscious of the needs of different communities the PCSP, in collaboration with the PSNI, delivered an engagement programme for the deaf and hard of hearing community with a focus on learning about the experiences and concerns of members of the deaf and hard of hearing community when interacting with the Police and the criminal justice system. The combined tour of Omagh PSNI station and Omagh Courthouse illustrated first hand some of the everyday issues such as use of intercom to access the PSNI station outside of public opening times and ensuring that there are no obstructions to the deaf person seeing the interpreter during court proceedings.



New summer drink-driving campaign launched

STRATEGIC PRIORITY 2:

TO IMPROVE COMMUNITY SAFETY BY TACKLING ACTUAL AND PERCEIVED CRIME AND ANIT-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

Most of the resources of the PCSP are directed to the delivery of Strategic Priority 2 which reflects the strategic priorities of the Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership addressing the identified needs of the local community:

- Road Safety
- Domestic and Sexual Violence
- Crime and the Fear of Crime
- Anti-social Behaviour

The actions detailed in Strategic Priority 2 take account of crime and anti-social behaviour hot spots and are designed to be imaginative and flexible in response to issues as they arise.

In the delivery of the Action Plan the PCSP works closely with designated member organisations and those who contribute to community safety in their particular field such as the RNLI.

To co-ordinate and deliver activity in the Action Plan the PCSP has several Working Groups as follows:

- Road Safety Working Group
- Business and Rural Crime Working Group
- Anti-Social Behaviour Working Group
- Domestic and Sexual Violence Working Group

Working Group membership is drawn from PCSP Members (elected, independent and designated) and other key stakeholders who can contribute to, or have an expertise in, the specific theme. Key stakeholders include Enniskillen BID, Omagh Chamber of Commerce & Roadsafe NI alongside relevant designated members.

The Domestic and Sexual Violence Working Group was established in February 2019 in to provide a more objective and strategic approach to domestic and sexual violence activity in the district. The PCSP also continues to be a member of the Western Domestic and Sexual Violence Partnership.

The Working Groups meet on a regular basis and each have responsibility to oversee the implementation of the relevant section of the Action Plan. The Chair of each Group provides a quarterly update to the PCSP meeting via the performance report card. The report cards are used to review progress made on the delivery of individual actions and identify any issues requiring remedial actions.

OVERVIEW OF PERFORMANCE

Road safety continues to be a priority emerging from public consultations and it is incumbent on the PCSP to develop and deliver a range of initiatives such as the Roadsafe Roadshow alongside on-going education and awareness raising aimed at all road users and all age groups. A significant collaboration project delivered by the PCSP is the remake of the DVD for the Crash Car Simulator. Delivered in partnership with Mid Ulster PCSP and in collaboration with the emergency blue light services the DVD is a powerful tool in driving home the road safety message and will refresh the Crash Car Simulator experience.

Neighbourhood Watch continues to play a key role in addressing fear of crime and in fostering community spirit. The Scheme promotes a self-help attitude and acts as a conduit to building relationships with PSNI officers at a local level.

This year the PCSP has embarked on a journey to raise awareness of domestic and sexual violence and the supports available. Activities delivered include seminars, information stands and training. Such is the demand on the PCSP for domestic and sexual violence awareness raising activity a dedicated working group has been established to look at this specific issue. The PCSP has established strong links with organisations working in this field such as Fermanagh Women's Aid and NEXUS and going forward is a key stakeholder.

The ability to support groups, through the small grants scheme, to deliver community safety initiatives is a significant strength of the PCSP. The scheme enables communities to deliver an appropriate response to an identified community safety issue taking responsibility and building capacity. This year the PCSP supported five groups from across the district with grant aid at 100% to a total amount of up to £2,000 per application.

Examples of good practice of community safety initiatives delivered in 2018-19 include:

- OCN Level 2 Domestic and Sexual Violence Awareness Training
- Crash Car Simulator DVD

OCN Level 2 Domestic and Sexual Violence Awareness Training

Working with Fermanagh Women's Aid the PCSP facilitated OCN Level 2 in Domestic and Sexual Violence Awareness training for 21 PSNI officers.



The training, delivered over one day, covered types and effects of domestic violence, causes of domestic violence, reasons why women stay in abusive relationships, the cycle of violence and critically for the PSNI officers how to communicate with and respond to women who have experienced domestic and sexual violence. This training is unique to the Fermanagh and Omagh district and has received significant media attention. Some of the participant comments on what they gained from the training include:





- *'An understanding of the victim, why they make withdrawal statements and don't want to leave the relationship'*
- *'I learned how subtle and manipulative perpetrators are and how crucial completing the DASH form is to get appropriate help'*
- *'Knowing what forms domestic abuse can take and realising how difficult it can be for victims to speak and open up about it. Also, how difficult it can be for her to leave'*





Crash Car Simulator DVD

Wishing to enhance the user experience a new DVD for use in the Crash Car Simulator was produced. In collaboration with Mid Ulster PCSP and the emergency services a new storyboard was created with filming taking place in the district.

Beesafe



The Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership (PCSP) co-ordinated and funded an initiative, for primary school children in the district, which covered a wide range of safety measures.

Over the course of a week, more than 600 primary seven pupils from 22 schools in the area took part in the innovative scheme which was hosted at Bawnacre Leisure Centre, Irvinestown. Presentations were delivered on a range of topics such as:

- Digital Safeguarding (PSNI)
- Road Safety (PSNI)
- Electricity Safety (NI Electricity)
- Farm and Rural Safety (Health and Safety Executive for Northern Ireland)
- Fire Safety (Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service)
- Safety in the Home (Fermanagh and Omagh District Council)
- Travel Safety (Translink)
- Water Safety (RNLI)

The aim of the event was to provide an imaginative way of teaching Primary Seven pupils how to prevent everyday accidents, how to avoid dangerous situations and how to deal with them safely and effectively. The sessions were designed expressly with the intention of encouraging high levels of interaction and involvement from pupils by getting them to participate in simulated scenarios in a controlled environment. This not only encouraged the children to think for themselves but also gave them practical experience of preventing and coping with potentially dangerous situations as opposed to simply being taught about managing risk in a classroom environment.

How much did we do?

- 1 Bee Safe event held – 591 participants / 22 schools

How well did we do it?

- 100% of the teachers completing the survey rated the event as either Very Good or Good

Is anyone better off?

- 91% of the pupils completing the survey reported that the event had increased their awareness of safety issues

An alarm unit, pendent and additional sensor are linked via a telephone line are provided. By pressing the pendent an emergency call is placed through to the call centre where an advisor will offer immediate reassurance and arrange for whatever help is necessary.






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STRATEGIC PRIORITY 2:

PCSP SMALL GRANTS

Overview of the work of the Fermanagh and Omagh PCSP – Small Grants

PCSP grant scheme was rolled out as part of the Fermanagh and Omagh District Council grant call and managed by Funding and Investment Unit. The call was open from 14 May– 15 June 2018. The call was advertised in the local papers, Council website, PCSP facebook page, FODC Community Newsletter and information sessions were held across the district.

The small grants programme was developed to provide groups/organisations with project based funding that will enable specific activities to be designed and implemented. These activities to result in positive and measurable change in terms of community safety.


Applicants had to demonstrate how their project addressed the following:

- Demonstrate evidence of need for the identified community safety issue
- Increase community safety through local intervention
- Identify the positive outcomes/changes that the project would deliver and how these would be measured.

Grant aid of 100% of total project costs up to £1,500-£2,000 per project was available.

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STRATEGIC PRIORITY 3:

TO SUPPORT COMMUNITY CONFIDENCE IN POLICING

The Policing Committee is responsible for enhancing public confidence in policing through its work in monitoring police performance in the delivery of the Local Policing Plan, ensuring that policing services are delivered for local communities. A copy of the Fermanagh and Omagh Local Policing Plan 2018-2019 can be found in Appendix B.

This Committee of the PCSP has an important role of oversight for local policing and gaining the co-operation of the public with the police in preventing crime and enhancing community safety within the district.

The Fermanagh and Omagh PCSP Policing Committee held six public meetings in the year. These meetings were an opportunity for an open exchange of views and opinions on local policing and for the District Commander to present up to date crime statistics and PSNI developments going forward. The District Commander reported to the Policing Committee each quarter on the delivery of the Local Policing Plan and the Engagement Strategy through a bespoke reporting structure detailing statistical performance along with a narrative telling the story behind the statistics and updates on the roll out of the Engagement Strategy. Presentations from the C3 Intelligence Branch and the Public Protection Branch further enhanced the Members understanding of the complexities and challenges facing local policing. The Policing Committee Report for the period 1 April 2018 – 16 March 2019 can be found in Appendix C.

In addition to the public meetings Community Police Liaison Committees in Enniskillen, Irvinestown and Lisnaskea were a further opportunity for community to monitor police performance at a more local level.

In developing the Local Policing Plan for 2019-2020 the District Commander liaised closely with the Policing Committee Members to ensure that the Plan offers an effective response to local identified need.

Throughout 2018-2019 the PCSP worked collaboratively with the PSNI to deliver a series of initiatives such as the promotion of the Speed Indicator Device, visits to community playgroups and organising crime prevention events. In addition to the dissemination of the relevant community safety message there was the added benefit of promoting and facilitating engagement of local community and police.

Three examples of collaborative working that merit specific mention include:

- Deaf and Hard of Hearing Engagement Events
- Community Cash

Deaf and Hard of Hearing Engagement Events

The Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership (PCSP) and the PSNI delivered an initiative to engage with members of the deaf and hard of hearing community to learn about their experiences and concerns when interacting with the criminal justice system. Through a public meeting members of the deaf and hard of hearing community expressed their concerns and frustrations when engaging with the criminal justice system and the very simple steps that can be taken to address these.

The combined tour of Omagh PSNI station and Omagh Courthouse illustrated first hand some of the everyday issues such as use of intercom to access the PSNI station outside of public opening

times and ensuring that there are no obstructions to the deaf person seeing the interpreter during court proceedings.



Community Cash

Another new initiative Participatory Budgeting (PB) was rolled out in 2018-19. Participatory Budgeting can be described as “local people deciding how to allocate part of the public budget.” It is a way for citizens to have a direct say in how public funds are used to address local needs. Participatory Budgeting is based on a simple concept: when the whole community has a say when money is spent, it leads to better decision making and to more people getting involved. It provides opportunities to engage in non-traditional ways that reach out to people who don't often have a voice but do have ideas on how they can improve their community.







The pilot referred to as Community Cash was rolled out in two electoral areas – Erne East and Mid Tyrone. Applications were invited that demonstrated: How will the project bring people together? OR How will the project make the community safer for all? Voting events were held where the local community decided what project should receive the funding available. Seven groups in each area received grant aid of up to £500 for projects such as a Christmas party for senior citizens, a drama production and crime prevention workshops.

This was the first time PB had been used in the Council and the PCSP the first to do so in Northern Ireland. The PCSP was invited to share its experience of PB at a PB Works conference in Belfast and has provided practical advice and support to other organisations such as the Big Lottery.

Community Cash is a different way for the PCSP to distribute funding to the community and voluntary sector and challenges how funding is allocated to groups. Using this model grant recipients are not only accountable to the funder but also to the wider community. Engaging, animating and making the community at the heart of the decision-making process increases community capacity and promotes democracy.

Stephen Mulligan, Community Cohesion Coordinator at Erne East Community Partnership who had £500 awarded said, “Our First Responder Scheme had 15 additional volunteers trained in September by NI Ambulance service. I am very grateful for this contribution that will be used towards equipment needed for the new responders. Participatory budgeting is recognised internationally now as a way for people to have a direct say in how local money is spent. It was very competitive on the night but quite humbling when other community groups also hoping for funding, decided to vote for our group. Their trust in our group could be rewarded in the future if one of our responders saves the life of someone in their community.”

Executive Summary:

Crime Overview - Crime has risen by a total of 224 incidents over the last year. As of 16th of March 2019, a total of 4298 crimes have been recorded, which is 224 **more** crimes than this time last year. 45 of these can be attributed to an increase in drug detections, with an additional 46 being attributed to a change in the way we record offences of Harassment and 81 being attributed to Domestic Abuse. A theft from vehicles is one area of concern. Vehicles at beauty spots are prime targets, which showed an increase of 42 offences compared to last year. A second area of concern is Theft from shops, which shows an increase of 48 compared to last year.

Community Engagement - Local Officers continue to build relationships within their Personal Areas of Responsibility, with much focus being on the younger community and those that may be vulnerable. Dedicated Engagement Patrols take place on a minimum of 4 days per week right across the District, which allows officers to concentrate on building relationships and working in collaboration with the community.

Vulnerability – Officers across the District are working hard to engage with all types of vulnerable persons, to ensure that we reduce crime and the fear of crime and build a better, stronger community. Excellent work is being done with the schools to raise awareness of internet safety, which includes cyber-crime and cyber-bullying.

Anti-Social Behaviour – We have 2943 incidents of ASB recorded between 01 April 2018 and 19 March 2019, which is **up** by 212 incidents from the same time last year. Traditional ASB seems to be on the decrease with digital ASB (texting, social media etc.) on the increase.

Domestic Abuse – Domestic related crime sits at 795 Domestically Motivated Crimes recorded between 01 April 2018 and 16 March 2019, which is **up 81** crimes from the same time last year. Some great work is being done in collaboration with Women's Aid and Active Listening and other statutory agencies to help those affected by Domestic Abuse. In addition to the 795 crimes, there have been 1786 Domestically Motivated Incidents, which is also on the increase by 128.

Road Safety – Seven people have lost their lives on the Fermanagh and Omagh roads in 2018/19, which is seven, lives too many. Officers across the District continue to educate and enforce but we can never do enough to stop the devastation that the loss of life on our roads brings to a community.

Drugs – Drug Seizures continue to increase year on year. The most common drug seized in Cannabis. We have made around 310 seizures (nearly one a day) and arrested over 170 people in relation to drugs offences.

Cyber – Cyber Motivated Crime is taking over from traditional crime. Between 01 April 2018 and 19 March 2019 we have recorded 99 cyber motivated crimes, which is up from 68 this time last year. Cyber Motivated Crime is the fastest growing crime trend across the world and creates very complex investigations for law enforcement agencies. Many of these crimes span across international boundaries, requiring collaboration across many different governments and jurisdictions.

Her class was made up of young people from dysfunctional families, those with special needs and a transgender young man. Police are working closely with PSCP and RNLI to organise the annual Emergency Services Day which is planned for Sunday, 26th May 2019.</p> <p>On Friday, 30th November 2018 Police held a joint workshop at PSNI Enniskillen for PSNI officers and Social Workers in the Western Health and Social Care Trust. This was jointly organised in order to help build relationships between both Services, so that the best possible service could be provided to young people who are residing in Children's Homes. This has been developed further with workshops held to allow all officers and staff in the District to attend.</p> <p>Police recently attended Good Relations training with Dare to Lead Change Project. We are working to have this OCN level training provided to young people across the Province who are engaged in the Department for Communities United Champions programme and Dame Kelly Holmes United Ambassadors programme. Police and staff from Department for Communities have continued to build a strong relationship, which is benefitting all the young people they engage with, and this collaborative working has been implemented as good practice by the Department for Communities and is now being developed across Northern Ireland.</p> <p>Local Neighbourhood Teams continue to organise and hold a number of Police Pit Stop events aimed at raising awareness around crime trends and provide advice to the community on initiatives and crime prevention.</p> <p>26/02/2019 – Enniskillen NPT attended a Careers Convention at St Michaels College Enniskillen.</p>

There were a number of cash seizures, vehicle's seized and quantities of class A and B drugs recovered. Community feedback has been very positive around these operations.</p> <p>Knife Crime has become a major issue for UK Policing and has featured heavily in the media. Thankfully this crime trend has not mirrored in NI and Police remain committed to proactive patrolling and community focused initiatives to ensure it does not become a feature.</p> <p>In January Omagh Police responded to a report of a possible pre-arranged fight and stopped a car containing a number of deadly weapons. The two occupants were arrested.</p> <p>Operation Snowflake commenced on 01 December involving High visible beat patrols and plain clothes officers patrolled the towns and villages in District on the run up to Christmas to prevent, deter and detect those involved in shoplifting. The idea behind the increased level of visibility was to increase confidence and deter or detect crime. Feedback from traders has been very positive and early indications suggest crime levels have dropped over this period. Local NPT officers took the lead on this initiative and the event was widely publicised and praised by the public.</p> <p>ATM thefts continue to be a focus and priority for Local Police and a taskforce has been setup to investigate this crime series. In August 2018 Fermanagh detectives arrested a Romanian crime gang suspected of involvement in a large number of ATM thefts across NI. As a result of house searches a significant quantity of cash was recovered concealed throughout the properties. Further arrests and searches have been conducted in relation to the most recent ATM in Fintona and enquiries are ongoing.</p> <p>Police have held a number of meetings and conferences with our An Gardaí colleagues and have organised and completed a number of operations to target and disrupt cross border crime gangs. The close working relationship has enabled a more concentrated and targeted focus against those that target the most vulnerable in our community.</p> <p>Police have attended a number of agricultural events such as the weekly mart and Fintona show to provide crime prevention advice to the agricultural sector. Trailer marking remains a popular initiative and has had a very positive impact. The reports of trailer thefts have significantly reduced over the years. Police continue to work with DARD and partners to raise awareness and crime prevention around livestock thefts.</p> <p>Rural thefts will always be of concern in the District and Police continue to patrol rural areas and remind farmers about crime prevention. Recently through a social media appeal, Police were successful in recovering a stolen John Deere tractor in the Fermanagh area and the investigation is continuing to apprehend those responsible.</p> <p>Police continue to meet and work closely with all licensees and publicans to reduce alcohol related crime.</p>

	<p>Police have run a number of awareness talks and also provided licensees with a quantity of cocaine indicator wipes.</p> <p>Police in Fermanagh and Omagh have conducted over 160 House searches within the district recovering various quantities of illegal drugs and stolen property.</p> <p>Operation Habit continues across Fermanagh and Omagh focusing on beauty spots and prevention around smash and grab type offences. A small local Police taskforce was set up to look into these crimes and concentrate our efforts. A number of cross border crime suspects have been identified and we continue to liaise closely with AGS to disrupt and detect this group.</p> <p>Fermanagh Neighbourhood Policing Team were successful in obtaining funding from the Organised Crime Task Force to have signage placed at Beauty Spots & Public Jetties across the District to remind tourists & locals using the areas to be mindful of their valuables. The project has involved a partnership approach & we have secured involvement from a number of bodies who own & manage the car parks & jetties.</p>

<p><u>ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR</u></p> <p>To continue to work towards a reduction of the number of incidents of Anti-Social Behaviour.</p>	<p>Following the serious issues and safety concerns we faced in June 2018 when Second Level Students were engaging in 'Jetty Jumping', Fermanagh NPT are working with Fermanagh & Omagh District Council in amending the On Street Drinking Bye Laws to include more open public spaces including some public jetties. This will bridge a legislative gap for next year to allow agencies to deal more effectively with the problem which if left unchecked will potentially result in the death of a young person.</p> <p>Officers continue to patrol known ASB Hotspots and work to identify offenders in order to prevent and deter instances and detect those involved. We do not seek to criminalise offenders' especially young people at every instance, so we seek to balance the response and allow officers to use discretion in how they deal with those detected. Police referral programs have been successful at educating and rehabilitating offenders without recourse to criminal convictions and court intervention.</p> <p>Community Planning Officers participated alongside Education Authority - Youth Service, on a 16 week programme in Lakeland Youth Centre, Enniskillen called the Youth Volunteer Academy. Young People were selected who are on the verge of criminality, and met with EA and PSNI on 16 consecutive Tuesday nights (October 18- February 19). They received basic First Aid Training from NIAS, completed an OCN Level 1 in Public Services, and were exposed to various different police departments as well as other Emergency Services, such as NIFRS. The objective was to improve their attitude towards Emergency Services, by learning of the jobs that they do in the community. A difficult 16 weeks, where there were many difficult conversations amongst 9 young people, but some very good results.</p> <p>The Youth Community Resolution Programme has continued to thrive. This is a programme where young people are offered a second chance to rectify their behaviour. It is jointly presented by Youth Justice Agency and PSNI and covers a range of ASB largely through drink/drugs, and majors on the effect the YPs behaviour has on themselves, their family and the community. Since 01/04/18 60 young people have attended this programme. The unique point of this programme is that parents must also attend, and in their bespoke separate programme we discuss why the young people has offended, building up resilience, the parents limits and boundaries, and offers a safe environment where parents can talk about their issues around bringing up teenagers – this helps them realise they are not alone, and often share tips and experiences.</p>

Regular meetings ensure risks are managed appropriately by the relevant agencies. Police recently attended an emergency meeting in relation to a victim of Domestic Abuse and a risk management plan was implemented to reassure and provide protection to the victim.</p> <p>Police attended Fermanagh Women's Aid Open day on 10th December in Enniskillen which was an excellent opportunity to network with other organisations and agencies. We were able to learn about other work that is being carried out and how we can help them to deliver the best possible service to victims.</p> <p>Police regularly attend the Domestic and Sexual Violence Working Group and a focused group has now been set up in conjunction with PCSP for the Fermanagh and Omagh area to create a strategic plan around support and prevention measures for victims of Domestic and Sexual Abuse. Plans are being made to meet with Church and Inter Faith groups in the area.</p> <p>In April 2019 Police are attending an event at Lough Erne Resort which will focus on Coercive Control. Whilst this legislation exists in other parts of the United Kingdom, it has not yet been extended to Northern Ireland.</p> <p>Specific requests to LPTs to give attention to HIGH RISK MARAC addresses (Omagh & Fermanagh) which they have built into their normal patrol plan. We continue to support Victims of Domestic Abuse but are very aware that this incident type is under-reported and seek assistance from other agencies to increase reporting, support victims and reduce offending. Police continue to highlight this issue through the use of Social Media.</p> <p>In relation to the number of reports of Domestic related incidents being reported there has been an increase of 7.4% for this year to date in comparison to the previous year. This equates to 1402 reported incidents compared to 1306 previously. In terms of actual Domestic Crimes there has been an increase of 12.3% which equates to 620 incidents compared to 552 in the previous year. Police welcome reports from victims but continue to focus our efforts on prevention, detection and support.</p> <p>Over 60 officers have now received the OCN Level 2 award in Enhanced Domestic and Sexual Abuse Awareness, which supports our drive to improve the service delivery to some of the most vulnerable in our community.</p>

Quay Lane continues to present problems for the Local Community in the area. Police have brought a Statutory Inter Agency Group to look at the problems in the Car Park in a bid to develop a long term solution as Police cannot deal with the wider associated issues in particular Environmental/Engineering aspects around the Car Park & New St. To date FODC have placed ramps across the Quay Lane car park which have had a positive impact from early comments made by local residents.

We are still enforcing RT Legislation and attempting to educate younger drivers involved. Routine patrolling and DVA Ops are a major part of our approach and zero tolerance is being shown to any motoring or ASB offences detected. We are keeping in contact with residents and will continue engaging with them and work to reduce their fears & concerns.

General Road Safety & Traffic Patrols and activities are normal business for LTP and NPT officers across the District. Teams carry out specific targeted activities most days during their limited 'down time'. The table below gives an indication of the levels of proactivity which is evident across the District around making our roads safer. Activities are logged by teams and include VCPs, Drink Drive Ops, Laser Ops, Hi Vis RT Patrolling, etc...

	<p>On 11th January 2019 Police conducted a search in Hillview, Enniskillen where they recovered a quantity of herbal cannabis valued at £300's and prescription drugs. One person arrested. Enquiries continuing.</p> <p>On 4th February 2019 Police on duty in the Omagh area carried out a stop and search under the Misuse of drugs Act 1971 of two suspected drugs dealers / suppliers. Just over £1,000's in cash was seized under the proceeds of crime act. The money is now the subject of proceeds of crime application. Enquiries continuing.</p> <p>On 4th February 2019 Police were called to the Royal Mail Depot, Enniskillen where they seized a package containing approximately 150 grams of herbal cannabis valued at £1500's. Enquiries continuing.</p> <p>On 13th February 2019 Police were called to the Royal Mail Depot, Enniskillen where Police seized a package containing 1Kilo of herbal cannabis valued at £20,000. On 26th February 2019 a follow up search led to the recovery of a further 150 grams of herbal cannabis. Two persons arrested. Enquiries continuing.</p> <p>On 3rd March 2019 Police conducted a stop and search of a vehicle in the Diamond area of Enniskillen, several wraps of suspected cocaine and MDMA seized were seized. Community Resolution Notice issued. This person has now attended a drugs awareness course.</p>

Local Policing Plan Measures	<p><i>PSNI Narrative</i></p> <p>To report to the PCSP on initiatives taken in partnership with other agencies to help reduce harm caused by cyber dependent, enabled and facilitated crime.</p> <p>Community Planning have been working with South West College as part of 'Sobering Moments' Programme. PSNI has given the performing Arts students the subject of 'Cyber-Crime' and 'On-line bullying' to produce usable material for primary, post-primary schools, teachers and parents. We regularly meet the students and listen to progress and advise accordingly.</p> <p>Working with PCSP funding has been secured through ARC for 'Invisible Theatre' productions in 8 of our Post-Primary Schools in Fermanagh & Omagh. A script was commissioned and actors selected by Big Telly Company, Portstewart. Productions took place 31st January/1st February 2019. This was hugely successful where actors were secreted into the schools at the start of the school day in full uniform as a 'new pupil'. During the assembly then police arrived to question the girl around a missing child who had been bullied online after an indecent photograph was distributed. A scene occurred which shocked both pupils and teachers, which were then followed up with an hour's workshop on cybercrime/indecent photos/ online bullying. A lot of useful conversations ensued with pupils talking about the experience for days after. Schools involved – Devenish College, Enniskillen Royal Grammar, Erne Integrated College, St Kevin's College, Drumragh College, Omagh High School, Sacred Heart, St Johns College, Dromore.</p> <p>All post –primary school principals have been written to requesting that they nominate ONE digital Champion, known as 'Digipal Champion' amongst their staff. This will mean 19 post-primary schools will each have a nominated teacher which forms a group. The group will partake in a one day training package with PSNI, WHSCT delivering on 28th March 2019. They will have access to an electronic support platform with 6 monthly training updates.</p> <p>Police in Fermanagh and Omagh have organised and attended a number of SCAMWISE Police Pit Stop events to educate and raise awareness around various methods these sophisticated criminals utilise in order to target vulnerable persons and steal large sums of money.</p> <p>This year, Community Planning has seen a massive increase in demand from schools for Cyber/online lessons. All schools without exception have experienced increased exposure to online problems such as sexting, online bullying etc and this must continue in an effort to make young people more aware and resilient to online pressures.</p>
