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CHAIRPERSON FOREWORD- Councillor John McClaughry

I have great pleasure in presenting the 2020-21 Annual Report for the Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership (PCSP).

This past year has been like no other for us all. We have experienced a global pandemic which has impacted on every aspect of our daily lives. From a PCSP perspective we have been unable to be 'out and about' as normal and both members and staff have missed the interaction and engagement with individuals and groups as we deliver PCSP activities.



Working in a Covid-19 environment has necessitated a new way of working for the PCSP; unable, due to restrictions, to deliver activities face to face. Very quickly we moved PCSP and PC meetings to the virtual platform which has worked well, and I would like to thank members for their co-operation embracing new technology. I am pleased with the co-operation and flexibility PCSP staff have demonstrated as they embraced home working and redeployment to other areas of work in the immediate response.

This year we welcomed five new Independent Members to the Partnership; each brings with them a specialism and experience that enriches the work of the PCSP. Three of our Independent Members Eithne McAnespy and Mairaid McMahon, Simon Wiggins stood down from the PCSP and I would like to thank them for their contribution during their time with us. We also said farewell to Chief Inspector Clive Beatty and welcomed Superintendent Alywin Barton as District Commander.

The pandemic has highlighted the large number of vulnerable people living in our community. People who are vulnerable due to illness, unemployment, victims of crime or other circumstances find themselves living in a challenging and changing world. I am pleased that PCSP staff were able to assist with the delivery of the Community Hub co-ordinating the distribution of food parcels, and with the Council led Christmas Cheer initiative.

Covid-19 challenged the PCSP to be more creative and innovative in how we deliver activity and engage with the community. We embraced the digital world producing an online version of the very popular Helping our Communities Stay Safe booklet and working with our partner organisation the NIFRS to produce an educational resource for P5 pupils on fire safety. We joined with other PCSPs to produce a regional digital Bee Safe resource for use in primary schools throughout Northern Ireland. While some of our established events such as Emergency Services Day were cancelled, we had the opportunity to roll out the Security Equipment Grant which assisted 10 community organisations to install/upgrade security measures on their premises.

I am delighted that we further cemented our work with Neighbourhood Policing Teams with all teams fully operational across the district. A PCSP Officer has been assigned as the point of contact with each NPT and this has allowed for greater flow of communication and collaboration in delivering joint initiatives across the district restrictions allowing.

Finally, I would like to thank PCSP members past and present in this year for their commitment and co-operation in what has been a unique, challenging and at times scary year for us all. Members and staff have rose to the challenge and embraced a new way of working enabling the PCSP to function within the parameters of the restrictions making a difference to those who we engage with.



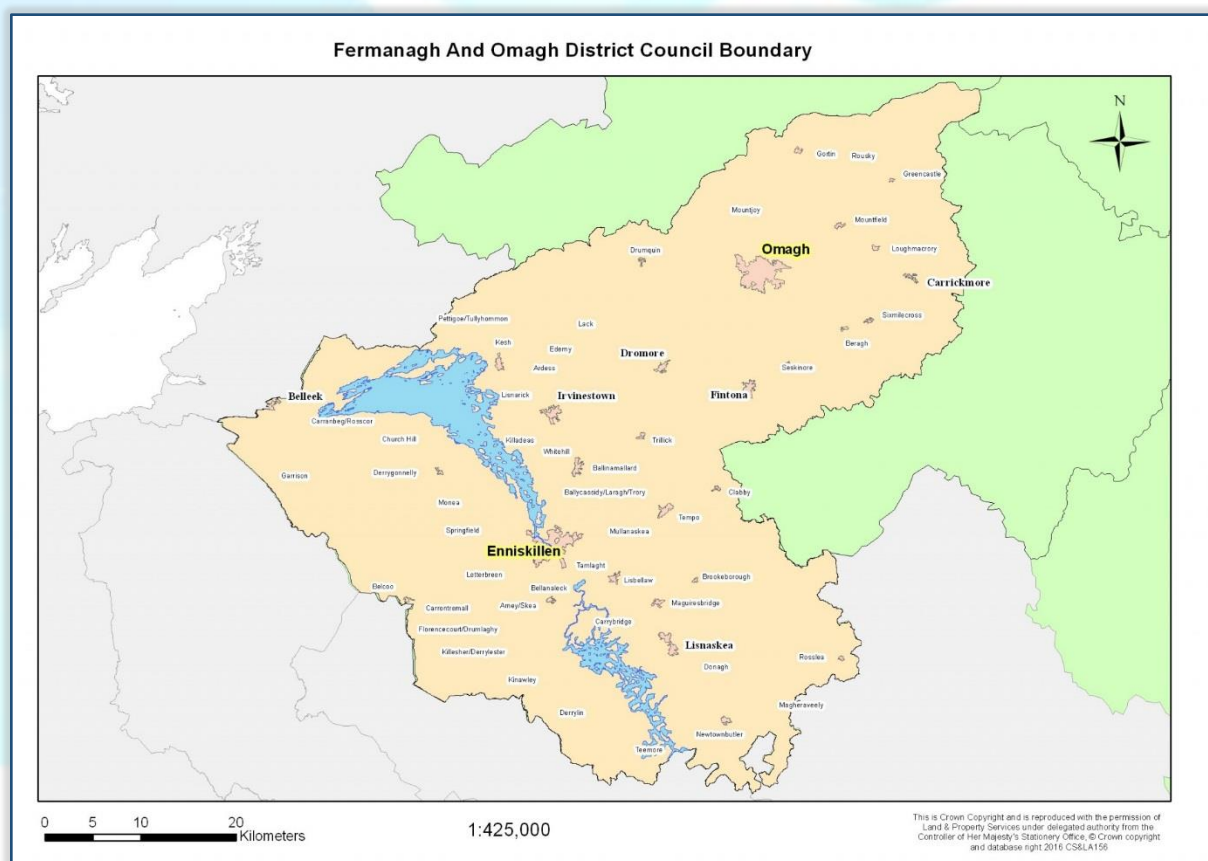

PROFILE OF THE FERMANAGH & OMAGH DISTRICT COUNCIL AREA

The Fermanagh and Omagh district span approximately 3,000 km² and is home to 115,000 people. The district is the largest in Northern Ireland in terms of land mass and the smallest in terms of population, with a population density of 38 people per square kilometre.

Fermanagh and Omagh is primarily rural; approximately 30% of the population live in the two main towns of Enniskillen and Omagh. A further 7% live in the towns of Carrickmore, Dromore, Fintona, Irvinestown and Lisnaskea. The villages and small settlements account for a further 17% of the population, with 46% of people living in open countryside.

Lough Erne, the fourth largest lake in Ireland, is full encompassed within the district. Part of the Sperrin Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) also sits within the district, as does UNESCO Marble Arch Caves Global Geopark.



THE FERMANAGH & OMAGH COMMUNITY PLAN

The Fermanagh and Omagh 2030 Community Plan is an overarching strategy which sets out the roadmap for the improvement of services and quality of life for the district by getting the public, private and community/voluntary sectors working together better towards a shared vision and eight long term outcomes.

The Action Plan sets out the initial partnership actions to be taken towards achieving the agreed outcomes. The actions included are those which will help to jointly tackle the major issues in the district which require a high level of partnership working to achieve with a focus, where possible, on prevention and early intervention. Delivering on these actions will bring added value to the core work of each of the individual partners, thereby effecting added benefits for citizens and service users.

Shared outcomes: the following outcomes are expressions of the results the Community Plan wishes to achieve for all people in Fermanagh and Omagh:

Resulting from the pandemic the Community Plan has refocused to address some of the more immediate issues arising. The priorities identified are:

Trauma Aware Communities

Nineteen actions have been identified which will be the focus for activity in the next 18-24 months. The Community Planning Partnership is committed to:

- Steer budgeting processes towards outcomes and priorities

The Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership is working with partners in the delivery of actions in the Community Plan reporting on activity as required.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY 1:

TO SUCCESSFULLY DELIVER THE FUNCTIONS OF THE POLICING AND COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP

In previous years the PCSP worked hard to raise its profile by organising large scale events such as the Emergency Services Day and attending events large and small across the district. Such events allow for members and staff to engage with the public to raise awareness of the role of the PCSP and to gather information relating to community safety issues and concerns and to gain understanding of the perceptions of policing that inform the annual PCSP Action Plan. Members enjoy these engagement opportunities and see great value in bringing the PCSP to every corner of the district. This has not been possible during the pandemic and members are concerned of the impact this may have on the profile of the PCSP.

Working within the guidelines and restrictions no face-to-face meetings of the PCSP took place during the year. All meetings were conducted via teleconference or MS Teams. Members young and old quickly embraced the new technology and going forward it is proposed that we have a mixture of virtual and face-to-face meetings.

This year we said farewell to some of our long-standing Independent Members and in June we welcomed five new Members. It is unfortunate that induction and training events did not go ahead as planned and that we have been unable to deliver our usual range of activities and events meaning that the new members may have to wait another year before they get the full understanding of the work of the PCSP and how they can contribute to it.

More than ever we relied on Facebook as a communication tool for the public – where feasible we moved activity online such as scams presentations and made information available in e-version, such as Helping Communities Stay Safe booklet.

Task & Finish Groups were formed as and when required to provide focus to a particular issue and enable members to participate based on their interest and availability. We propose to continue to work with Task & Finish groups as we have found it to be efficient and effective.

Online course gives hairdressers and beauticians the tools to help abused clientele

SHUTTING the signs of domestic abuse, and responding appropriately to disclosures is the important theme of an upcoming online course for hairdressers and beauticians across Omagh.

Organised by Fermanagh Women's Aid in partnership with Omagh PSNI, the course, which is free of charge, is entitled 'In Safe Hands: How Salon Professionals Can Help'.

A spokesperson has encouraged all salons to get involved and share the word with employees - particularly as statistics showed that 100 per cent of those who attended the session in the past had been told of abuse.

"With proper training on how to recognise the signs of abuse and safely refer victims to help, salon professionals can become invaluable and influential community partners in the fight against domestic abuse," they said. "Survivors are more likely to disclose to someone that they trust - and that could be you."

The training session, for you and your employees, will help you find out what to do if this is the case, how to respond, and where to signpost your clients.

All participating salons will receive a certificate of attendance, and a free resource pack for their salon.

The course has been kindly funded by Policing & Community Safety Partnership.

Businesses urged to protect their premises from crime

This is a difficult time for many businesses, but the Police and local Police and Community Safety Partnership (PCSP) have issued some crime prevention advice which may assist in protecting your business premises at this difficult time.

If your business is currently closed due to Covid19, this is a good time to review your security to reduce the chances of your premises being targeted by opportunist thieves.

Supt. Clive Beatty said: "During the COVID19 pandemic we are continuing to patrol all business premises. If your business is temporarily closed, you should follow the crime prevention advice below:

- Mindful of government health advice, conduct regular security checks of your premises.
- Test and set your alarm and ensure it is fully operational.
- Ensure internal doors, security gates, bollards and fire exit doors are secure.
- Remove high value items into secured locations (if practical).
- Remove cash from the premises and install signage stating all cash or valuables have been removed.
- If your business is providing critical services during #COVID19 please:
- Ensure you have adequate staffing and management present.
- Consider allocation and queuing systems.
- Follow social distancing measures.
- Position staff to manage entrances.

Where possible SIA licensed security officers should have a visible presence.

Establish queuing contingency plans, including any car parking areas and ensure appropriate security staffing levels.

Clr Thomas O'Reilly, PCSP Chairperson said, "This is a worrying time for many local businesses, not just in terms of what the future might hold, but also in terms of protecting your premises from opportunistic theft at this time. Implementing good crime prevention practices may help mitigate against theft or damage."

TRAILER MARKING

PARKING CONES GET A MAKE-OVER IN THE NAME OF SAFETY

Fermanagh & Omagh PCSP recently delivered a number of new parking signs to schools in the Fermanagh and Omagh District Council area where problems with illegal and inconsiderate parking had been identified. Working in partnership with the PSNI and local schools the innovative signage reminds adults just who they're putting at risk by parking poorly and dangerously.

"Inconsiderate parking around schools is putting the safety of children and others at risk. Our advice to drivers stopping near schools is simple:

- Never park outside or opposite school gates
- Never park on yellow lines or zig-zags
- Do not park on footpaths
- Do not obstruct residents' driveways or dropped kerbs
- Do not obstruct the school crossing patrol
- Never park within 15m of a junction"

SECURITY GRANTED

To help continue to create safer, shared communities, Fermanagh & Omagh PCSP have established a Security Equipment Grant. Grants are designed to assist groups with the implementation of practical crime prevention initiatives such as installing security fencing, lighting, or replacing external doors for community-owned premises.

A total of £48,620 was given to schools and community groups across the District allowing them to continue their good work in the community knowing their premises are safe.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY 2:

TO IMPROVE COMMUNITY SAFETY BY TACKLING ACTUAL AND PERCEIVED CRIME AND ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

Most of the resources of the PCSP are directed to the delivery of Strategic Priority 2 which reflects the strategic priorities of the Fermanagh and Omagh Policing and Community Safety Partnership addressing identified need.

- Road Safety
- Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence
- Crime and the Fear of Crime
- Anti-social Behaviour

The actions detailed in Strategic Priority 2 take account of crime and anti-social behaviour hot spots and are designed to be imaginative and flexible in response to issues as they arise.

OVERVIEW OF PERFORMANCE

Road Safety

We continued to deliver road safety initiatives where possible during the year. When restrictions allowed the Crash Car Simulator was available for schools to ensure that road safety awareness education was not neglected during the pandemic.

We ensured that Speed Indicator Devices were deployed in strategic locations across the district working with the PSNI and community organisations to raise awareness of speeding issues.



In collaboration with Jo Jingles and Roads Policing we produced a short video presentation aimed at children aged 3-5 years highlighting good practice for road safety.

Working with the PSNI, we engaged with seven primary schools to raise awareness of speeding and inconsiderate parking near school buildings. Each participating school received two bespoke no parking signs.

We are delighted that through the PCSP and the PSNI Life After has moved to work in the Fermanagh and Omagh District Council area and we look forward to working with the group and its committed membership in the future.



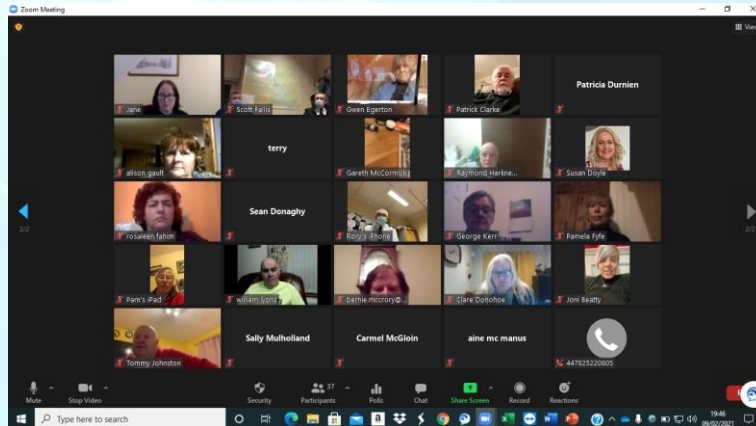
Neighbourhood Watch

We recognise the role of Neighbourhood Watch schemes in helping the community be safer. The co-ordinators give their time voluntarily and it is important that they are supported in their role and have access to relevant information about local crime and emerging trends.

Operating Neighbourhood Watch requires significant staff resource to ensure that the co-ordinators are kept up to date with relevant issues in their area. One PCSP staff member, the Community Safety Liaison Officer acts as the main contact for all the Neighbourhood Watch schemes.

Due to restrictions we have been unable to host co-ordinator meetings or our annual NHW conference. We recognise that this has great potential to impact on the volunteer spirit of the co-ordinators who like to be connected and kept informed of relevant information. Throughout lockdown the Community Safety Liaison Officer maintained regular contact with co-ordinators to pass/receive information and generally keep them in the PCSP/NHW loop.

We held several co-ordinator engagement events via Zoom which proved to be very successful and we plan to hold events on this platform going forward.



Social Alarm Scheme



The Social Alarm Scheme received an unprecedented number of referrals with clients each receiving the base unit and one peripheral. The scheme is available to those who are vulnerable due to age, medical condition, isolation and wish to remain in their own home. The personal alarm provides support to those concerned about home safety or personal well

bring to live safety and independently at home. An alarm unit, pendent and additional sensor are linked via a telephone line are provided. By pressing the pendent an emergency call is placed through to the call centre where an advisor will offer immediate reassurance and arrange for whatever help is necessary.



Covid-19 Response Grants



We worked with Fermanagh and Omagh District Council Covid-19 Response Fund to fund several projects in the first lockdown. One of the projects funded was Men's Action Network Isolation Helpline where we funded a helpline for males aged 18+ who are experiencing loneliness and isolation as a result of the pandemic. We also funded Addiction NI to extend the supports available through the Drink Wise Age Well to assist those coping with addiction issues and who due to lockdown were not able to access face to face support. Another project was to provide activities for young people to give them a sense of purpose during the summer period.

Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence

We continued to work with the Western Domestic and Sexual Violence Partnership to develop and deliver online training on raising awareness of domestic and sexual violence.

In collaboration with the PSNI, Fermanagh Women's Aid and Omagh Women's Aid we facilitated the delivery of awareness raising training sessions with hairdressers, beauticians and pharmacies.



Bee Safe

Understanding that Bee Safe could not be delivered in the usual format we collaborated with other PCSPs to commission an external provider to produce a virtual presentation. Each PCSP took responsibility for a theme ours being Water Safety working with the RNLI. While restrictions impacted on the original proposal, we are delighted with the end product. Bee Safe is an imaginative way of teaching Primary Seven pupils how to prevent everyday accidents, how to avoid dangerous situations and how to deal with them safely and effectively. We are appreciative of the work of Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon PCSP for taking the lead on this initiative.



Fire Safety Video

We were approached by the NIFRS to discuss how it could continue to deliver the important fire safety message to Primary 5 pupils. It was evident that the NIFRS could no longer visit schools to deliver the presentation in person. We agreed to assist our partner to produce a video presentation and were delighted when other PCSPs decided to work with us. Security Equipment Grant

This year for the first time we offered a grant for security equipment. The grant was available to community organisations for security equipment for their community owned premises. Grants of up to £5,000 at 100% funding were available. 26 applications were received, and 10 projects received funding to the value of £48,620.

Projects were from across the district and did much to raise awareness of the PCSP reaching groups that previously we had little or no engagement with.

Community Cash

Plans to roll out Community Cash were changed to factor in restrictions and community safety concerns. Very quickly we realised that public voting events could not be held, and we had to identify an alternative voting format. The Task & Finish Group felt that moving the process online was the only way forward. Applicant groups were invited to submit an application form which was assessed by the Group and those meeting the threshold were invited to submit a two-minute presentation outlining their project and the community safety issue it was addressing. Thirteen projects were funded including a demonstration video for mobility scooter users, an anti-social behaviour programme delivered by Yr 14 students to Yr 8 students and first aid training.

Crime Prevention

We delivered a series of crime prevention initiatives throughout the year.

As part of Positive Ageing Month in October the PCSP worked with the South West Age Partnership (SWAP) to promote and deliver key safety messages – with a particular emphasis on doorstep scams.

Two PCSP officers undertook Level 4 Crime Prevention delivered by the Police Crime Prevention Academy.

Where feasible working within the restrictions we promoted crime prevention initiatives such as working with car dealerships to promote awareness of keyless car entry theft.

We delivered 4 trailer marking sessions in different locations in the district marking a total of 48 trailers.



RAPID Bins

There are six bins across the district. This year a total of 8,985 drugs items were disposed in bins – this is a considerable number given that some of the locations were closed to the public during lockdown periods.

Collaboration with Fermanagh and Omagh District Council

We were pleased to work alongside colleagues in the Council throughout the year. During the first lockdown PCSP staff members worked in the Community Hub helping the public in relation to food availability, prescription delivery and general assistance.

In collaboration with the Environmental Health team we produced a video aimed at raising awareness of safety issues in the home targeting 3-5-year olds.



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STRATEGIC PRIORITY 3:

TO SUPPORT COMMUNITY CONFIDENCE IN POLICING

The Policing Committee is responsible for enhancing public confidence in policing through its work in monitoring police performance in the delivery of the Local Policing Plan, ensuring that policing services are delivered for local communities. A copy of the Fermanagh and Omagh Local Policing Plan 2020-2021 can be found in Appendix B.-

This Committee of the PCSP has an important role of oversight for local policing and gaining the co-operation of the public with the police in preventing crime and enhancing community safety within the district.

The Fermanagh and Omagh PCSP Policing Committee held three meetings in the year. These meetings were an opportunity for an open exchange of views and opinions on local policing and for the District Commander to present up to date crime statistics and PSNI developments going forward. The District Commander reported to the Policing Committee on the delivery of the Local Policing Plan through a bespoke reporting structure detailing statistical performance along with a narrative telling the story behind the statistics. Presentations on the work of the Vulnerability Team and discussions on policing in a Covid-19 environment further enhanced the Members understanding of the complexities and challenges facing local policing. The Policing Committee Report for the period 1 April 2019 – 31 March 2020 can be found in Appendix C.

Undoubtedly the restrictions have impacted on level of police and community engagement. At the beginning of the year the CPLCs took the decision not to meet face-to-face and as many did not have the technology or the ability virtual meetings were not feasible. Throughout the year one PCSP Officer was assigned to act as an ongoing point of contact with CPLC members while this proved very effective in terms of communication and maintaining relationships it was extremely time consuming. We still see CPLCs as an effective engagement tool and will work in the coming with the PSNI and community representatives to introduce CPLCs elsewhere in the district.

This year saw some changes in PSNI personnel across the district. We welcomed a new District Commander Superintendent Barton and two new Chief Inspectors, Rory Hoy and Robert McGowan. There are three district Inspectors in place, and we look forward to working with a more stabilised policing team.

In developing the Local Policing Plan for 2021-2022 the District Commander liaised closely with the Policing Committee Members to ensure that the Plan offers an effective response to local identified need.

Where feasible working within restrictions we worked collaboratively with the PSNI to deliver a series of initiatives such as the promotion of the Speed Indicator Device, visits to community playgroups and organising crime prevention events. In addition to the dissemination of the relevant community safety message there was the added benefit of promoting and facilitating engagement of local community and police.
