A New Community Plan and Local Development Plan

Improving social, economic and environmental wellbeing and achieving a better quality of life for our people, communities and place is a key priority for Fermanagh and Omagh District Council.



Councils have been identified as lead partners in community planning and land use planning responsibilities were transferred to councils on 1st April 2015, enabling an integrated approach to both planning functions. Following extensive consultation and data gathering, the Council and a range of key partners have drafted the first ever Fermanagh and Omagh Community Plan, together with a Strategic Environmental Assessment. A Preferred Options Paper (POP) and related Sustainability Appraisal is also being developed as part of the preparation process for the new Local Development Plan.

Both documents will be launched for consultation on **Monday 3rd October 2016**, for a period of eight weeks. In advance of the consultation period, further bulletins will explain Community Planning and the purpose of the Local Development Plan, highlighting some of the evidence and data which has informed them and providing information on engagement opportunities.

What is Community Planning?

Community Planning is a process of collaborative and partnership working, led and facilitated by the Council, with key partners, to increase the well-being of our citizens. It will join up and improve the services provided by public sector agencies, business, voluntary and community organisations and make sure we are all working with local people to agree on shared outcomes and priorities for improvement. Together, we have developed a draft Fermanagh and Omagh Community Plan which identifies at a high level the key priorities associated with the development of the area over the next 15 years.

The three key themes which have been identified in the Plan are:

- People and Communities
- Economy, Infrastructure and Skills
- Environment

These themes, together with agreed shared outcomes prioritise the direction of travel of the Plan. "Our Vision is of a vibrant, living place where people enjoy improved wellbeing and prosperity in a safe, shared, connected and sustainable environment".

Issue 2 Pre-consultation Bulletin

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These draft plans will be launched for consultation on Monday 3 October 2016, for a period of eight weeks. In advance of the consultation period a series of 4 bulletins will explain Community Planning and Land Use Planning, highlighting some of the evidence and data which has informed them and provide information on engagement opportunities.



Citizen participation and involvement is very important in developing the Community Plan and the Local Development Plan Preferred Options Paper. From the outset, this has been led by evidence and data to ensure a robust Plan that deals with real local issues. The evidence which we have gathered to date helps us to understand what life is like for people living, visiting and working in the Fermanagh and Omagh area. It is only when we fully understand what is currently happening in our area, that we can identify where improvements are needed and, ultimately, achieve better social, economic and environmental outcomes for all.

The Fermanagh and Omagh District covers almost 3000km2 in landmass and is home to 115, 000 people. It is by far the largest geographically of the 11 Councils areas whilst also being the most sparsely populated. The district has a border with 4 councils in the Republic of Ireland and is the most westerly district in Northern Ireland. The challenges presented by the UK's decision to leave the EU are likely to impact significantly in this area.

People living in Fermanagh and Omaghgenerally have a strong sense of place and pride in their local areas, with evidence of high levels of appreciation for the surrounding outstanding and unique natural environment.

What is a Strategic **Environmental** Assessment and a **Sustainabilty** Appraisal

In 2004, the Northern Ireland Assembly passed regulations which require us to assess, consult and monitor the likely impacts of plans, programmes and strategies on the environment. The process is called a Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) and the process is threefold, as outlined below: Strategic Environmental Assessment Process

1) Determination Report to consider whether the Plan is likely to have a significant environmental impact. This is a short report, with a series of yes/no answers. If the plan is considered to not be likely to have a significant environmental impact, the process stops here.

2) Scoping Report to identify the significant environmental issues and level of detail required, which includes collecting baseline data and identifying a methodology.

3) Environmental Report, the final report, citing the issues, alternatives, actions and measures for monitoring the impact on the environment.

Each stage of the process must be consulted on by both the Natural Environment Division in the Department of Agriculture, Environment and Rural Affairs and the Historic Environment Division in the Department for Communities.

Strategic Environmental Assessment of the **Community Plan: Key Findings**

The Community Plan should:

1....seek to improve the physical and mental wellbeing of the population

2....support the ageing population to live healthy, independent and socially connected lives

3....promote safe, inclusive, resilient and vibrant communities

4....support the younger population by addressing educational inequalities and promoting life skills 5....seek to improve public utilities infrastructure 6....protect, enhance and sustainably manage the outstanding natural environment and cultural heritage 7....safeguard all designated sites, habitats and priority species from adverse impacts, loss and fragmentation 8....promote improved access to the countryside in a sustainable manner

9....support the district in becoming more energy efficient 10....seek to reduce the district's carbon footprint

The SEA notes that the key issue the Community Plan must address - and the value it adds is balance. In the absence of the Community Plan as an overarching, long term, strategic document, social and economic objectives could be set in isolation of environmental objectives. With this in mind, the SEA identifies 22 objectives by which the Community Plan has been assessed and will continue to be applied as the Detailed Action Plans are developed. They are:

11....promote the use of sustainable models of transport where possible

12....seek to ensure that public transport connections, cycling and walking routes are easily accessible to all

13....seek to protect and, where possible, enhance shared and inclusive open spaces

14....seek to protect existing areas/sites which are at risk from flooding

15....seek to minimise the production of waste

16....promote the level of recycling, supporting the achievement of the 50% target under the Waste Directive

17....promote awareness of climate change and environmental issues and empower the local community to become more resilient to climate change

18....seek to bring a sense of balance to the utilisation of alternative energy sources and material assets against the preservation of our environment

19.... seek to make the district a more attractive and accessible place for living, visiting and working

Overview

The Strategic Environmental Assessment has carefully considered the potential environmental impact of the outcomes and associated strategic actions of the **Community Plan. The Sustainability Appraisal has** considered all of the options outlined in the Preferred Options Paper (POP) of the Local Development Plan, and goes beyond environmental implications, considering the social and economic sustainability of the District that may result from the Local Development Plan.



What is the Local Development Plan

The Fermanagh and Omagh Local Development Plan (LDP) 2030 will set out a clear vision of how the Council area should look in the future by deciding what type and scale of development should be encouraged and where it should be located. It will also identify land that should be protected for its environmental or social use and encourage high quality design and a regard for our valued heritage and landscape.

The Preferred Options Paper is the first stage in developing the plan and will set out the key planning issues for the district, identify a range of options to address them and define the Council's preferred options. It will describe options on how to distribute development across the district: as well as options to deal with economic development, renewable energy, development in the countryside, tourism, mineral development, and quality design and place making. Our Local Development Plan can only be truly successful if it is rooted in local knowledge and an appreciation of what is important to people. You should get involved because it's all about your place and your future, so your views are important.

Is Community Planning different to Land Development Planning?

The Community Plan and the Local Development Plan are two different plans which, together, will shape the future of the Fermanagh and Omagh district and the places where we live, work and visit. They have been informed by local people through engagement, a robust statistical evidence base to support the options presented and partnership working with key stakeholders to ensure better outcomes for all through integrated planning. In summary, and notwithstanding important differences between land use and community planning, there are some **core similarities** in their broad principles and processes.

They include working to achieve:

- Better outcomes for all
- / Improved performance through partnership working
- \checkmark Improved services and places for all through better planning
- Sustainable development
- Longer term approaches
- Fundamental citizen participation
- Joined up approach to planning and shaping the places where we live, work and visit
- Better use of resources

However, there are **differences**. The Community Plan will provide the vision for the Fermanagh and Omagh district, outlining key aims for the future in relation to social, economic and environmental factors. The Local Development Plan focuses on how land and infrastructure within the district should be managed and developed to support delivery of the shared outcomes identified in the Community Plan.

Community Planning Partners and the Fermanagh and Omagh District Council Planning Department are committed to carrying out joint community consultation and engagement, letting you know what is happening and, more importantly, supporting you to play an active part in contributing to both plans. The next issue of this bulletin will update you on the key evidence and data which has helped inform the plans.
