In addition, PRONI has collected a wide range of archives from private sources over the years. These range from a single letter written by an ordinary individual to a vast landed estate archive containing thousands of documents. Other privately deposited archives include the records of churches, businesses and a number of photographic collections. PRONI holds millions of documents that relate chiefly, but not exclusively, to Northern Ireland, They date largely from c.1600 to the present day (with a few dating back as far as the early 13 th century).
