Sustainable Development: Development of a Local Nature Reserve at Creggan Bog in partnership with An Creagan Visitor Centre



A new Local Biodiversity Action Plan (LBAP) to protect and promote Fermanagh and Omagh's rich natural heritage and wildlife was launched on Monday 21 March 2016 at An Creagán Visitor Centre to coincide with the declaration of Creggan Bog Local Nature Reserve (LNR).

At around 12Ha, Creggan Bog LNR is a small, undisturbed remnant of a once much larger area of raised bog. In spite of its small size, surrounding development and drainage, the peat is still actively forming. The keen recorder might see species such as bell heather, cranberry, bilberry and varied sphagnum mosses as well as the Irish hare, common lizard, large heath butterfly and smooth newt.

Volunteers are currently busy at Creggan Bog LNR helping to deliver a range of conservation actions as part of the Heritage Lottery Funded project BOGland. It aims to restore 8 acres of degraded wetland, turning it from unloved wasteland into a haven for wildlife and an oasis for people.
